The interment will be at the People's Cemetery.

A VERY sudden death took place yesterday morning. Mrs. Burns, widow of the late Moses Burns, arrived in the city by the train Thursday night. The four children of the deceased are in Charlottetown, and with a sorrowing husband and other friends are left to mourn. The funeral takes place Sunday afternoon at 3.30.

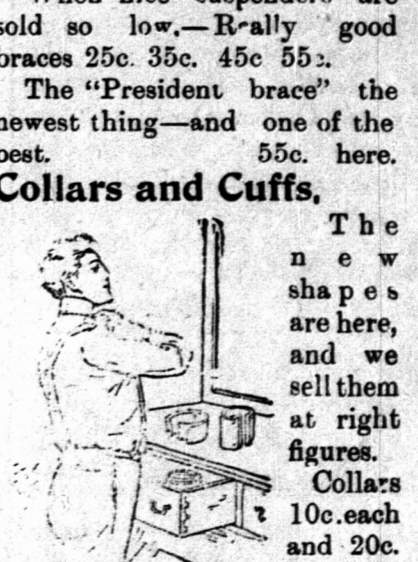
