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Golds Firm On Toronto Exchange

TORONTO, July 8.—(CP)—Golds established a firm market on the Toronto Stock Exchange today despite dull trade and over-all low volume. Base metals were quiet and mostly unchanged while western oils sold off despite news of the bringing in of Leduc No. 5 well.

The exchange's closing index listed golds up .73 to 110.26, base metals .16 to 82.22 and western oils down .74 to 33.86. Volume for the day was 801,000 shares, about 66,000 below yesterday's total.

Western oils failed to react to news of Imperial Oil's Leduc No. 5 well coming in and the majority slipped back narrowly in a consolidated move. Foothills and East Crest made minor gains but losers included Globe, Anglo-Canadian Calmont, Home Oil, Okalta, Pacific Petroleum, Roxana and Roy-alite.

Golds were down in majority but key issues posted some good gains to bring the whole group up. In the senior list Hollinger and Lake Shore advanced fractionally while Dome and McIntyre receded. Better juniors were Campbell, Consolidated Realties, Crowshore, Keno Hill, Little Long Lac, Malartic, Pickle Crow, Preston, Springer. Losers included Cochenour, Giant, O'Brien, Roy-bar, San Antonio, Shawkey, Star-ratt.

Base metals were mixed on gains for Chromium, Eureka, Hudson Bay, Nickel, Normetal, Oatsko and Sherritt and losses for Denison, East Sullivan, International Uranium, Quebec Manitou and Steep Rock.

OTTAWA, July 8.—(CP)—The Commons' Radio Committee the Commons recommended against in a final report tabled tonight in the establishment of a new body to license and regulate radio in Canada on the grounds that the circumstances did not justify a fundamental change in the existing set-up.

When the final report was tabled Donald Fleming (PC-Toronto) rose on a question of privilege and said he wanted to state that the report was not unanimous. It was a majority report and no Progressive Conservative member of the committee had voted for it.

Forest Fires In Nfld.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., July 8.—(CP)—All able-bodied men from villages at the head of Bonavista Bay were called out tonight as forest fire

swept down on settlements along the south bank of the Terra Nova River, driving villagers from their homes for the second time in a week.

Last week the woods workers and fisher-folk of Traytown 100 miles northwest of here evacuated the village and prepared to board a ship which entered Bonavista but progress of the fire was slowed and the village reported out of danger.

But the fire was re-kindled Sunday and the Newfoundland Rangers' detachment at Glovertown reported that today it was within nine miles of Traytown.

Recently four young people, rowboating near Detroit, Mich. sought a thrill by riding in the tumbling wake of an excursion steamer. Result: three drowned when rowboat capsized. Every summer death takes his toll of the foolhardy who flout common-sense safety rules. Here are some pictorial don'ts to remember if you go boating and want to return safely.

FIRE is doubly dangerous on a boat. Cigarettes and highly volatile gasoline don't mix—safety. **BOAT ROCKING** has been talked about so much it's trite—but it's still the chief cause of boat accidents. **SHOW-OFFS** who enjoy plaudits of friends may enjoy the pulmotor less. **PLEASANT** is the cooling breeze whistling by when you sit on the bow of a fast-moving speedboat. Unpleasant is the fall that often follows. **SMALL BOYS** should stay out of boats unless accompanied by adults. Boys in picture may retrieve their paddles or they may get a dunking—if nothing worse.
