Special Prizes for Young Ayrshire Breeders

A special meeting of the Pioneer Boy's Ayrshire Cattle Breeding Club was held last evening in the office of the Department of Agriculture, at which several interesting features of value to the Club members was discussed. Mr. C. A. Archibald of Truro, N. S., was the guest of honor and introduced the arrangements of special prizes to be given at the Charlottetown Exhibition where the members of the Club will exhibit their heifers and heifer calves. Mr. John Andrew of East Royalty acted as chairman. The following list of special prizes were arranged as follows: For the best Ayrshire heifer owned by a member of the club in making awards, fifty percent will be allowed for confirmation and fifty percent for production; fifty percent of the prize money being donated by the Dominion Live Stock Branch and fifty percent by the Provincial Department of Agriculture: 1st, \$25; 2nd, \$20; 3rd, \$15; 4th, \$10; 5th, \$7; 6th, \$5; 7th, \$3; 8th, \$2; 9th, \$1; 10th, \$1; 11th, \$1. A special prize for the boys who have made the greatest improvement in their heifers from time of purchase until exhibiting at the fall fair: 1st, \$20; 2nd, \$15; 3rd, \$10. For the best heifer calf owned by a member of the Club and the product of the heifer shown in Class A, by the same member, fifty percent of the prize money is donated by the Dominion Live Stock Branch and fifty percent by the Provincial Department of Agriculture: 1st, \$10; 2nd, \$8; 3rd, \$6; 4th, \$5; 5th, \$4; 6th, \$3. The awarded prize money, Mr. Oliver Rattenbury of the Dominion Live Stock Branch to the Club members for the best average production of milk and butter fat secured during the period of the competition.

The Late Mr. Oliver Rattenbury

A telegram received by Mr. Nelson Rattenbury of this city brought the sad news that the late Mr. Oliver Rattenbury had passed away in Winnipeg on Saturday evening last. The late Mr. Rattenbury who was sixty-two years of age was a native of St. John's, Nfld. He was educated at the University of Toronto and studied law in the office of the late Hon. ourable John Longworth and Mr. E. E. Hazzard, now Mr. Justice Hazzard of the Supreme Court Bench. Mr. Rattenbury was called to the Bar in May 3rd, 1887 and was a partner of the law firm of Hazzard & Rattenbury, and also of Lewis & Rattenbury when the then Mr. Davies, now Mr. Louis Davies, was partner of the Supreme Court of Canada, became a partner. Subsequently the late Mr. Rattenbury carried on a successful law business in this city, associated with Mr. Charles Tweedy, under the firm name of Rattenbury & Tweedy. In the year 1906 he was appointed, removed to Winnipeg where he resided up to his death. At the outbreak of the Great War several of his sons enlisted, and also his youngest brother, Mr. Morton Rattenbury, B. A., who was a partner with him in business. The loss of his youngest son Reginald, who was killed at the battle of Vimy Ridge and the terrible anxiety during the years of the war proved too much for him as he indeed did for many others, resulting in a gradual decline until the end came. Mr. Rattenbury was active in both in the Province, and in Manitoba, and he received special honours for that party in the past form during a number of campaigns. The late Mr. Oliver Rattenbury will be well remembered by members of the Bar here of some practice, as well as those of our people who are now in middle life. He was of a reserved nature, but very kind and friendly with all who enjoyed his acquaintance. At the time of his departure from the Island all regretted to see Mr. Rattenbury leave his native land, because he had an excellent practice here; but like so many of the professional and other men of that time he felt that there was a far greater and growing West for his ability and profession. He had not been disappointed and he lived
