LONDON, June 8.—Lady Cowans, widow of Sir John Cowans, Quartermaster-General, who fed and clothed the British Army has been forced by circumstances to offer for sale the orders and decorations won by her husband during his military career. It is understood however, that a stranger to the widow has arranged to buy the whole collection, to pay her the money and allow her to keep the mementos of Sir John's service to the army and upon her death to present them to the nation as a memorial of the great soldier's work. Lady Cowans very frankly states her position. Her husband died insolvent after four years' work with health shattered as a result of his task in feeding 7,000,000 troops.

"I shan't try to kiss you again."

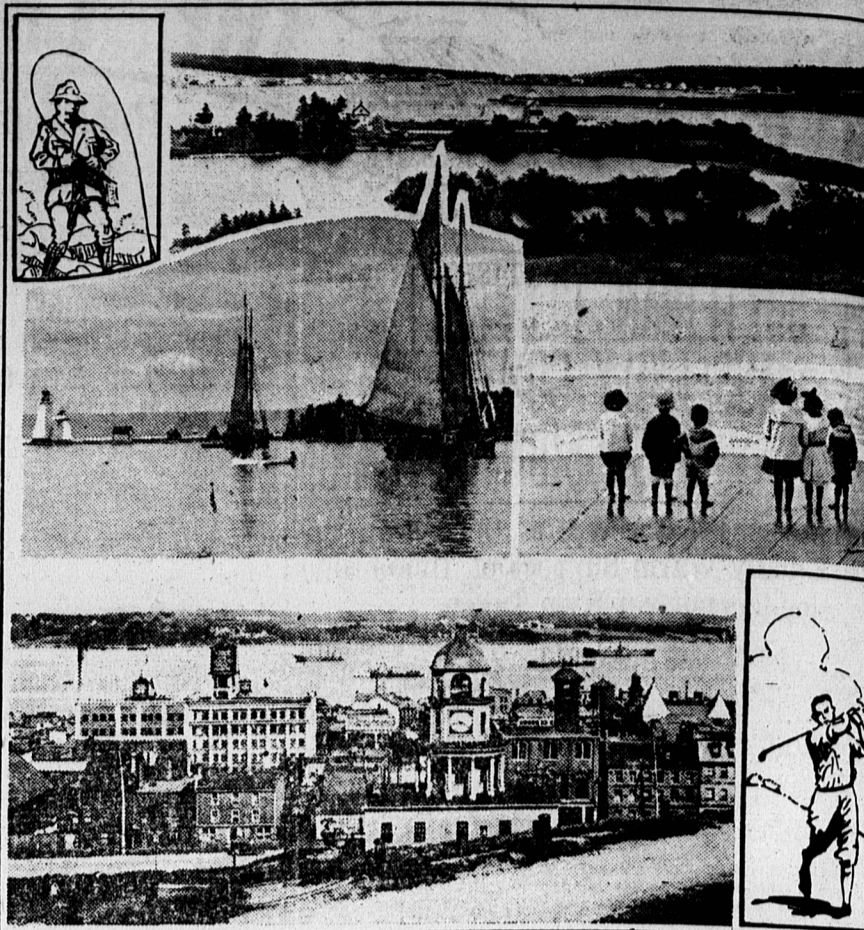

Warren, (Mount Stewart); J. A. Moore, (Pownal); Geo. Crews, (Cornwall); J. Hughes, (York); J. McInnis, (Winsloe); Bertram Lee, (Vernon River); J. Ross, (Montague) and T. J. Wigginton, (Souris). At the opening of the Ministerial Session, the Revs. S. Howard, C. Graham, J. F. Denny led the opening devotion at exercises. The College report on the Probationers Studies was received and considered satisfactory. Mr. A. D. Hoberlin was recommended to be continued on probation. The meeting regretted that the Rev. C. W. Keirstead felt compelled to ask for a year's leave of absence on account of what it is hoped is but a temporary indisposition. A suitable resolution was passed. Messrs. T. TRIED IN RUMANIA FOR CRIME DONE IN ONTARIO

TORONTO, June 8.—Nick Rutka, charged with committing a murder in Thorold, Ontario, is to be tried for his life in far off Roumania. The warrant deposition and information documents are being forwarded today by the Attorney General department and provincial Secretary department. The papers will first go to the British Consul at Montreal and from him to the British Consul in Roumania.

It will be one of the unique cases in the history of the province. Last August, Adam Zolton was stabbed to death. The papers going forward to Roumania, contain affidavits from witnesses charging Nick Rutka with the murder.

Three men were involved in the attack on Zolton. Two of them, Nick Thomas and Harry Rutka, were arrested and at the assize in Welland were both sentenced to death. Later the sentence was commuted to life imprisonment. Nick Rutka escaped. He was traced to Buffalo and then for a time he was lost sight of. However the escaped Roumanian wrote to friends in Ontario and the police got trace of where he was. His addresses were given as Zuchta, and Bukovina, Roumania.
