AN ALLNIGHT BANK.

LONDON, August 26.—The all-night bank will soon make its appearance in London. The first of the banks will be opened in Piccadilly, and will be followed by other branches in different parts of the West End.

The new concern will have the title of the Day and Night Bank institutions in New York and other places in America. An English syndicate has already registered for the purpose and large premises have been obtained on the south side of Piccadilly at the Leicester Square West End.

The bank will remain open the whole twenty-four hours. Later it may be open for business on Sunday also. Two or three separate staffs of cashiers and clerks will be necessary for this continuous service.

It is admitted in some quarters that the system by which the large banks close their doors at 4 or 5 o'clock in the afternoon is in many respects unsatisfactory for the requirements of the majority of the British public. Owing to the change in habits in regard to both business and pleasure, many business establishments have to keep large amounts of cash, representing the day's takings, on the premises all night, and frequently over Sunday, and the money is, of course, exposed to risks of burglary and fire.
