INMEMORIAM

MR. JESSE WATTS

A man "after God's own heart" passed away on Feb. 21st, 1920 in the person of Mr. Jesse Watts of West Cove Head. He was born some 60 years ago at Harbor Grace, Newfoundland. While a boy he moved to Charlottetown, Royal, P. E. I. and later to Grand Tracadie, where he resided a number of years. When 24 years of age he married Miss Emily Lamer of Georgetown, who proved a true help-mate to him in the succeeding years. Sixteen years ago he took up his residence at West Cove Head where he endeared himself to all, by his kindly quiet way and christian integrity. He frequently spoke of the day, when as a youth of 16, he sought the Lord, and experienced that change of heart through which lives are made anew. Immediately he became a member of the Methodist church and used his talents in the Master's service, both as superintendent of the Pleasant Grove Sunday school and as Class Leader. Later in life, as his christian experience grew riper, he became a Local Preacher, and whenever heard, his words were as "Live coals, from off the altar" and were backed by a living experience which made them messages of power and conviction. Always he found unspeakable joy in witnessing to the mercy of a loving God. Unfortunately, a week or so before his decease, he contracted a severe chill which developed into pneumonia and ended fatally. During his closing hours he was deeply conscious of the Master's presence, and sang fervently "Rock of ages, cleft for me," and repeatedly asked for reading from the "old black book" which he loved so well. Needless to say, his loss is deeply felt, and his place will be hard to fill. Many were the expressions of sympathy with the widow and relatives on the day of the funeral, when his Pastor, Rev. F. H. Littlejohn conducted divine service at the home. All feeling that in the passing of Mr. Watts they had lost a friend, interment was made at the York cemetery. Besides his widow, he leaves three brothers and sisters, viz.—Benjamin of Tracadie, Henry C. of Pleasant Grove, Frederick of York. Mrs. Nell Higgins and Mrs. Wm. Carr of Brookline, Mass. and Miss Rosie of Boston, U. S.
