NEW HAVEN, Conn., Jan. 14.—"Please do not send expensive flowers" to your girl guests and their chaperons at the "prom" is the meaning of the Yale Junior Promenade Committee request to students to limit their expenditures. The "prom" will be held on January 19 after several "days" of small entertainings. It is a costly week because of the flowers, carriages, hotel bills and carriages. Ever year the students whose purses are light find it necessary to pinch later in the year if they keep up with the wealth. Hence the following semi-official request from the Yale editorial column:—"Precedent by its force has quite forbidden our prom guests to wear flowers to the promenade proper. Seeing the wisdom of this custom, the Promenade Committee would discourage a too generous expenditure on flowers whatever to their own guests. The purpose in this idea is self-evident. The expenses on the prom festivities are great. Yet by cutting down on these things not essential to the prom gaieties may be brought more and more within the reach of large numbers of men. The idea truly is a good one, and all even those best able to afford the most expensive flowers, should stop to consider that by the precedent of excessive generosity they are making a nice luxury an expensive necessity."

A WEALTHY MAN DIES.

THE GAAND JURY NOW DISCHARGED

The Grand Jury found true bills a-service of the petition by the petitioner Joseph J.
