THE TALLEST BUILDING IN THE WORLD

Is Now Being Erected in the City of New York.

TWENTY-FIVE STORIES.

The Structure Rests on Caissons. Fireproof Throughout, With Marble Lined Corridors.

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—Workmen are now busy upon the foundation of what is to be the tallest office building, from basement to roof, in this city or in the world. This is the structure to be erected for directors of the National Bank of North America, and to be known as the Wall Exchange Building.

Charles W. Morse, who has won considerable reputation through his combinations of banking interests in this city, is the real leader of the enterprise for the erection of this structure. Several months ago Mr. Morse and his associates got control of the National Bank of North America, which then had a capital of \$1,000,000 absorption and merged it into the bank of the state of New York, which had a capital of \$1,200,000 and a surplus of \$56,000, and moved the enlarged bank to the home of the latter concern at the northwest corner of William street and Exchange place. That corner plot, containing only 3,300 square feet, has since been sold for the enormous price of a million dollars.

Adjoining the corner on the west, at Nos. 43 to 49 Exchange place, is a plot of about four lots, practically 100 foot square in which a forestry of iron work is rising into place. Mr. Morse organized from among his fellow directors in the bank the Wall Street Exchange Building Association, which purchased the plot and began the erection of the skyscraper. It will contain 25 stories and a basement. The National Bank of North America will occupy the ground floor and the State Safe Deposit vault will be installed in the basement.

The facade of the structure will be granite on the lower stories, brick and terra cotta above, and the treatment will be Italian in type. The architects will make the side and rear walls ornamental by introducing to a limited extent light colored brick to contrast with that of darker shade.

From basement to roof, exclusive of the pent house, the building will be 337 feet high which means about 327 feet from the street level to the roof. This exceeds even the Park row building, today the tallest office structure in the world, for while the towers of the latter rise 382 feet above ground, the height of the roof itself is only 309 feet. The height of the St. Paul Building, at No. 229 Broadway, is 408 feet.

The Bank of North America's new structure will contain about 7,524 square feet of rentable space to a floor. Including the basement, there will be about five acres of rentable space in this structure and yet it stands on only four lots of ground.

They will be the most productive four lots, from the standpoint of revenue in the world. At an average rental of two dollars a square foot per annum, the yearly income from the new building will be nearly \$400,000. The structure rests on caissons, which have been sunk to bed rock. It will be fireproof throughout, with marble lined corridors. The George A. Fuller Company, the contractors, are to have it ready on the first of next May.

All those reports are false, absolutely untrue, and I think were proven so the 2nd inst., in court.

One of the lawyers tried hard to damage my reputation, but was unable, the Magistrate having to ask him several times to confine himself to his case, not private matters. The Examiner I noticed was kind enough to say I had five drinks while in Charlottetown. This of course is another error as every one knows. The other papers said I had purchased five bottles, which was true.
