**C. P. R. WRECK**

(Continued From Page 2.)

The Vickerson Block was shattered by the concussion, while buildings in all parts of town were perceptibly shaken. To add to the excitement the wrecked building caught fire, but the splendid work done by the fire brigade soon controlled the flames, and this source of danger was overcome. As soon as the explosion occurred hundreds of citizens were on the spot, and the injured baggage man was taken from the ruins and rushed to the hospital. An examination showed that his left leg was shattered to such an extent that immediate amputation was necessary, and the operation was at once performed. In addition to injuries to his legs, McLeod was terribly burned, his whole body being a mass of charred flesh. After the operation the deceased rallied well, and hopes were entertained that the doctors would be able to pull him through. The work of the doctors ever and about five o'clock Friday morning death relieved the injured man of his awful sufferings. Bickford, who is suffering from burns and shock, is rapidly regaining strength under the careful care of his doctor and the nurses of the hospital. He is severely burned about the face and neck.

The effect of the explosion was first in an upward direction, the roof being completely torn off. Then suddenly the walls fell down in an outward direction, and the explosive, what ever it was, then struck through the floor and buried itself in the earth beneath. It had not been yet ascertained whether it was dynamite or nitro-glycerine. It was dark when the accident happened, and a fire broke out immediately afterwards, the town brigade had a busy time of it for a few minutes.

Had the accident happened a few minutes before the loss of life might have been serious, as the train had only left the station shortly before the explosion occurred, and there was fully 50 people on the platform when the train arrived.

The police were soon on the scene and two travelling photographers Harry Nein and Harry Leine, were placed under arrest as they were attempting to leave the town by the early train Friday morning.

The men will be detained at the barracks of the Edmonton detachment until next Friday, when an inquest will be held over the remains and the conclusion reached that the explosion was the result of the blowing up of a quantity of flashlight powder contained in the trunk of supplies the men had checked to Lacombe, where they intended to carry a certain amount of photographic work. When examined by the officers Nein and Leine said they had been sent out on the road by a Calgary photographer named Avelidon, and that prior to leaving the studio in the southern city they had seen their employer mix a quantity of the flash light powder, one of the ingredients of which was magnesium powder. They did not know the exact amount that was prepared, but thought it would be slightly in excess of one pound. The powder was packed with a quantity of plates, cameras and chemicals used in the development of pictures, and the entire lot was placed in a small trunk and checked to Lacombe.

If it can be proved that Nein and Leine were carrying explosives and their trunk they are liable to heavy penalties.

Section 21 of the Canadian Railway Act, 1903, says: "No passenger shall carry gunpowder, dynamite, nitro-glycerine, or any goods which are of a dangerous or explosive nature. And any person who sends by the railway any such goods without distinctly marking their nature on the outside of the package containing the same, and otherwise giving notice to the station agent or employee of the company whose duty it is to receive such goods for the purpose of carrying the same, shall forfeit to the company the sum of \$500 for every offence."

Part 8, section 509 of the criminal code, 1910, says: "Every one who causes any event by an act which he knows would probably cause it, being reckless whether such event happens or not, is deemed for the purpose of this act to have caused it wilfully."

Part 8, section 511, says: "The Act goes on to say, 'Mischievous causing danger to life, etc., punishments: (A) imprisonment for life; (B) fourteen years imprisonment; (C) five years; (D) two years; Everyone is guilty of the indictable offence of mischief who willfully destroys or damages any of the property in this section mentioned,

and is liable to the punishment specified in this section, that is to say: To imprisonment for life if the object damaged is a dwelling house, ship or boat, and the damage is caused by an explosive, and any person in such a dwelling house, etc., and the damage causes actual danger to life."

The funeral of Everett G. McLeod was held on Sunday last. The local fire brigade, of which deceased was a valued member, took charge of the funeral arrangements. The funeral service took place at the Presbyterian Church on Sunday afternoon. The coffin was taken to the church on the ladder truck of the brigade, which was drawn by members of the brigade. The truck had been beautifully decorated for the occasion, and was a most appropriate innovation. Arriving at the church, the coffin was carried inside, and a very impressive service was conducted by the Rev. M. White, B. A. The church was crowded, the citizens of the town having turned out to do honor to the departed, almost in a body. It was the largest funeral ever held in these parts, and showed in no uncertain way the great respect the citizens of Lacombe had for the deceased. After the service the remains were once more taken in charge by the brigade, and taken to the depot where they were shipped east on the evening train. The pall bearers were Messrs. Jackson, George and Cunningham, of the C. P. R., staff; D. Hay, A. D. Watson and F. Taylor, of the fire brigade. Beautiful wreaths were sent by the brigade and citizens. Deceased came here about six years ago from his home at French River, P. E. I. He homesteaded near Gadsby, after which he took a position in the C. P. R. offices. By his most accommodating and genial manner he won every citizen of Lacombe for a friend. He had several relatives here and at Bowden. One brother was living in Lacombe at the time of the accident. His mother is still living at the old home on P. E. I., his father having died several years ago.

To the sorrowing mother and other relatives, the sincere sympathy of the citizens of Lacombe is extended.

The Coroners Jury will sit on the case next Friday morning at 10 o'clock in the town hall, when it is expected the police will be some solution of the mystery to lay before them.

LACOMBE, Alta., Oct. 27.—That Everett G. McLeod came to his death from injuries received from the explosion of a trunk in the baggage room of the C. P. R. depot at Lacombe on the evening of October 12, 31, and from evidence produced it is the opinion of the jury that the trunk causing the death of the said Everett G. McLeod, was checked over to the C. P. R., from Red Deer to Lacombe by Henry Leonard Nein and Harry Leine.

The above is the verdict of the coroners' jury on the death of the C. P. R. baggage man, who was killed in the explosion, which wrecked the depot here on the 12th, inst. Bickford, the assistant baggage man, who was also severely injured at the time, was able to leave the hospital and appear before the jury. He is still very weak and suffers from the severe burns received. His evidence was with reference to the trunk which exploded and which was taken off the train by him on the evening of the accident.

Several other witnesses were called with reference to the trunk, the most damaging evidence to the parties under arrest being given by the baggage master at Red Deer, who identified positively Leine and Nein as being the parties who checked the trunk from Red Deer to Lacombe.

From evidence brought out the trunk contained a large amount of potassium chlorate and magnesium metal powder.

Leine and Nein were taken to Fort Saskatchewan tonight by the R. N. V. M. P., to await a preliminary trial on a charge of manslaughter.
