LIBELS UPON COLONIALS.

A journal published in London which has a wide circulation and occasionally reaches Canada is known as Reynolds's Newspaper. It claims to be an exponent of British democracy, but has from time to time been quoted abroad by the enemies of Britain, because its favorite themes are those which afford scope for scandalizing the Empire and the Colonies. It was but natural that such a journal should form a vehicle for much that would be offensive to loyal and patriotic people during the continuance of the war in South Africa, and even since the peace has been declared it has continued its pro-Boer and disloyal utterances.

We might and would pass by those recurring diatribes were they confined to matters which concern the British Isles alone. In that case the answer would be given where the offence was committed and amongst the people most concerned. But this disreputable journal has repeatedly gone out of its way to fling mud at the brave men who have gone from the various colonies to fight their country's battles in South Africa. Much of its venom has been directed against the Australians and New Zealanders, whose heroic conduct has earned for them only the savage and scornful veneration of this sheet. We may leave the Australian press to answer these vile charges, but we are concerned that the lies published by Reynolds against our Canadian boys shall not pass unchallenged.

In order that our readers may know the extent and nature of the falsehoods published in Reynolds's Newspaper we subjoin a few specimens taken from a single one of its issues. We quote:

Every soldier who has been much in the field and has talked much with Tommies and fellow Colonials has heard dozens of stories and atrocities as bad as those related by the Bushveldters—or nearly so. I do not think I am far wrong in saying that Boers are murdered every week. There are columns, such as the Canadian Scouts, in which it is understood that right through prisoners are not taken, but are to be shot right off. The commanding officer does not line his men up and say, "I—herby give orders," etc. But there are other ways of achieving the same result. The Canadians are far the worst in this respect, and they will tell you with much satisfaction of scalping and "necktie-parties."

And again:
The hanging by Canadians in American fashion (that is with revolver accompaniment) of four Boer surrenders because of an alleged white flag incident some time before, I have seen indignantly denied by a Canadian colonel in England. If that colonel did not know it was quite true, he ought to have known, because nine Canadians out of ten can give him all information about the story. I have come back with some well-defined ideas. First that the Boer is on the average a much more chivalrous man than the average Tommy (who mostly approximates to the city larkin); or than the average Colonial, who is a man of much more excited and excitable passions than the Boer; or than the average Canadian, who is simply a white Red Indian and should be absolutely prohibited from taking part in civilized warfare.

It is nothing to Reynolds's Newspaper that these Canadians to whom he attributes every characteristic that is cruel, base and vile have been accredited by their commanders, by their fellow-soldiers of

the British forces and even by the Boers themselves with the most manly and soldierly qualities, with courage in battle and signal humanity towards their defeated or surrendered foes. Lord Roberts' praise of Canadian soldiers passes for nothing with Reynolds, for the Commander, according to that most mendacious of journals, was "promoted for proving his incapacity!" British notions of the freedom of the press tolerate such vile diatribes and permit Canadian citizen soldiers to be openly libelled as "White Indians" who should be prohibited from taking part in civilized warfare. This is not the prohibition that is needed. What the situation calls for is a prohibition of the uncivilized warfare of a lying press, which stabs worthy reputations, defames honest character and, lacking the courage of the assassin or the rebel, seeks constantly the overthrow of the government by which it is protected, and under whose protection its malignant and nefarious life is prolonged.

LIGHTNING STRIKES CHURCH.

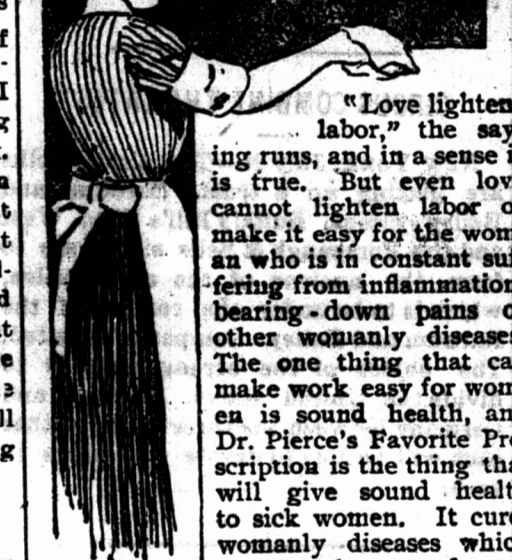

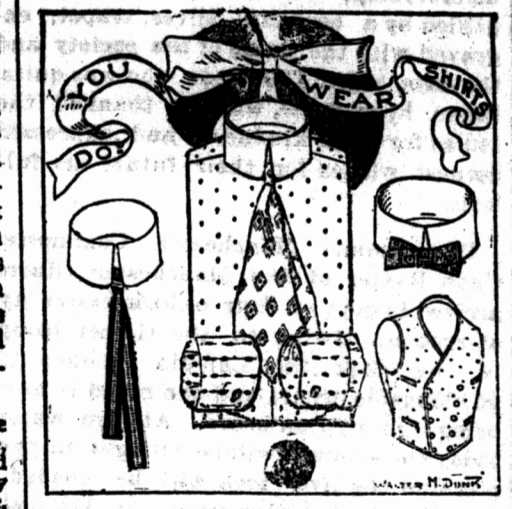
