—SERIOUS FIRE.—

On Tuesday night between ten and eleven o'clock the dwelling house of Mr. Peter A. McMahon, of Emerald was seen to be on fire. Mr. Colin Mathieson who first noticed it gave the alarm. The fire started upstairs presumably from a pipe igniting with the floor and when first seen, seemed all on fire. Fortunately there were a few good men in the house and but for their timely aid it would have been impossible to save the building as there was no roof ladder at hand. Too much praise cannot be given to Messrs Frank Croken, Bernard Murphy, Wendell McKenna and Sablaus McKenna who fought through the smoke and flames and carried water to extinguish the fire; also to Russel Dechan who drew water from a well 85 ft. deep. Had anything gone wrong with the well buckets, had the fire not been seen when it was in five more minutes it would have been impossible to do anything. There was no insurance and Mr. McMahon's loss will be about \$100. To Messrs Murphy, Croken, McKenna and Dechan, Mr. McMahon and family tender their sincere thanks and to all others who assisted at the fire.
