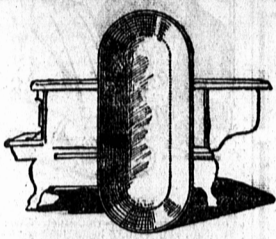

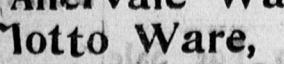

RUSSIAN GENERAL TORN TO PIECES

Infuriated Soldiers Fall upon Him After He Has Shot a Corporal Dead and Wounded a Commander.

ODESSA, Aug. 21.—A remarkable letter received from a soldier in the Seventy-first (Belavsky) Regiment, stationed at Novo-Alexandria, Province of Lublin, is reported to have been received here, relating how the commander of the brigade, Major General Remis, was literally torn to pieces by the regiment after he had brutally murdered a corporal. The general appeared before the regiment and explained that the Fourteenth Army Corps, of which the regiment is a part, had been ordered to the front. He added, however, that he could not accompany the corps to the front. Then there were cries of "Scoundrel!" and "Coward!" from the ranks. "Approaching our company," continues the writer, "where on the right flank stood the company commander and a corporal, he pointed his revolver at the latter and demanded: 'Tell me immediately, you reptile, who shouted among your men.' The corporal replied that nobody in our company had shouted. 'You lie, you dog,' shouted the general, and fired. The corporal fell dead. 'Not satisfied with this, the general aimed at him a second time and fired, but the bullet missed him, hitting instead the company commander, who also stumbled and fell on the spot. It is impossible to comprehend what happened then. Like tigers the soldiers threw themselves upon him, and in less than a minute all that remained of the brilliant general was shapeless mutilated flesh. 'The commanders of the Seventy-first and Seventy-second Regiments called on the Cossacks, but when the latter fell upon the men the soldiers met them with a volley from nearly 1,000 rifles. When the dust had settled there were stretched on the ground about thirty Cossacks, besides which the commander of the Seventy-second Regiment was killed, and our own commander was left wounded in the breast. He was removed from the scene by an officer, as not a single soldier would stir from his place. 'On the next day there arrived from Lublin the commander-in-chief of the division, Lieutenant-General Suirnoff, who, after a long and persuasive speech, succeeded in recovering the body of the murdered general from the soldiers."

MINUTES OF PRESBYTERY.

At Charlottetown, and within St. James Hall there on Tuesday, August 22nd, 1905 and at 12 o'clock noon, which place and date the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met pursuant to adjournment at the call of the Moderator and Clerk and was constituted, R. G. Sinclair, Moderator pro tempore, with whom were present F. C. Simpson, M. N. McLeod, H. H. McIntosh, Geo. Millar, A. Oraise, D. McLean, E. McDonald, E. J. Ruttee, R. G. Strathairn and A. D. Sterling, ministers, and T. C. James, elder. Elder's commissions were received from the sessions of Belfast, Malpeque, Souris, Brookfield and Cavendish in favor of Alexander McKenzie, Archibald Ramsay, Archibald Currie, William Laird and James Simpson respectively, and their names added to the roll of Presbytery. The Clerk laid on the table a call from the Foreign Mission Committee of the Presbytery Church in Canada, Eastern Section, in favor of A. D. Sterling, Kensington, to undertake mission work in Princes-town, Trinidad, and stated that the session and congregation of Kensington and Long River had been elected to appear for their interests at this meeting. The conduct of the Clerk was approved. Dr. A. Falconer, Pictou, who had been appointed, along with T. C. James, to represent the Foreign Mission Committee, was unable to be present. Mr. James, being the only commissioner, urged the status of Princes-town and the Foreign Mission Committee upon Mr. Sterling and the Presbytery. The following commissioners from the session and congregation of Kensington and Long River were then heard, viz., William Brown, John Anderson, James Gillespie, William Ramsay, Newton McLeod and Daniel McKay. After discussion it was moved, seconded and carried:—That Presbytery place the call in Mr. Sterling's hands, but in so doing would urge upon him the most careful consideration of the blessing of God upon his work in the home field, the strong claims of the congregation of Kensington and Long River upon him to continue the truly great work he has begun among them, as well as the strong wish of his brethren in Presbytery here assembled that he should not leave the bounds. The Moderator then handed the call to Mr. Sterling, which was declined by him. Presbytery then decided to set the call aside, and expressed sympathy with the Foreign Mission Committee, and also the hope that they may soon secure a suitable missionary for the vacancy in Princes-town, Trinidad. The court adjourned to meet at the call of the Moderator and Clerk of which public intimation was made and this secretar was closed with the benediction. A. CRAIG, PRES. CLERK.

TEACHING WITHOUT LICENSE.

TORONTO, Aug. 23.—Osgoode Hall today saw a revival of the famous action to prevent the Christian Brothers, Grey Nuns and other members of the Roman Catholic committees from teaching in separate schools in Ontario without first procuring certificates as public school teachers. The Whitney Government carried the test case to a court of appeal on the question as to whether the members of the various religious bodies are eligible as teachers. The case will be contested until a final decision is given by the impartial privy council.
