HOUSEHOLD HINTS FOR WINTER TIME GIVENS

DISHMOPS SAVE YOUR HANDS

How to wash dishes efficiently with the minimum of hot water is a problem. A cloth-covered funnel that conforms many ways, particularly at this time of year, particularly the housewife sometimes has to do with the all of least good of getting hot water.

Every homemaker knows that dishes should be washed as carefully in summer, as in winter. An excellent way to insure clean dishes under these circumstances is to scrape every dish before it is placed in the water. USE SCRAPER.

A scraper can be used, or a paper towel, or even a small wad of newspaper so that water is not absorbed. The absence of tools. Then fill the dishpan with sudsy water as hot as you can stand. Wash the dishes in the correct order of least soiled ones first starting with glassware then silver, then the tableware and finally the pots and pans.

Wash each piece in water and then in another dishpan or pail or other receptacle that is filled with hot water. It may be kept hot over a low flame. Wash the dishes thoroughly and hung in the sun, if possible to dry to help keep it clean and sweet-smelling. This procedure of washing the dishes will demonstrate that it is not necessary to have endless hot water in order to do an efficient job.

As I have noticed recently a new beef price chart in my butcher's shop. Are the ceiling prices listed upon it?

Yes. Ceiling prices according to the grade of beef are listed on the chart. Consumers should check this chart before making their purchases, prices may also vary from week to week and therefore consumers should keep a careful check on their purchases prices.

Excuse me, but I believe the price was excessive. Is there a fixed ceiling price on rebuilt washing machines?

A—Yes. In no case may the price of a rebuilt machine be more than 80 per cent of the original retail selling price of the machine when it was new for model built during 1940. Prices of older models vary and are listed in an order available at any office of the Board.

THE COOK'S CORNER

ROSE HIP JAM

(For County Dweller)

Cover hips with boiling water and simmer until tender; rub through sieve. To each pound of pulp add 2 cups of sugar, and rapidly stirring occasionally to prevent sticking until the mixture falls from spoon in sheet.

FULL OF GOODNESS

For dessert full of goodness, beat 2 eggs lightly and mix with a cup of milk. Make alternate layers of cooked rice and chopped dates or raisins, using 2 cups cooked rice and 1-2 cup dried fruit. Put honey over each layer using 2-3 to 1-2 cup. Pour milk and beaten egg mixture over all and bake in moderate oven for 45 minutes.

FRUITED WHOLE-WHEAT BREAD

1 cup chopped, pitted dates, or figs or raisins, 2-3 cup (lightly packed) brown sugar, 1 cup milk, 4 cups whole-wheat or Graham flour, 4 teaspoon baking powder, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons melted shortening Broken nuts (optional) Combine the fruit and brown sugar and add the milk; let stand for 10 minutes. To the flour add baking powder and salt, and combine well. Add this dry mixture to the dates, then add the melted shortening; combine well. Add water to make a stiff dough. Turn the batter into a well-greased loaf pan (or baking powder tins) and let stand for 20 minutes. Bake in a moderately hot oven, 375 degrees, about 45 to 50 minutes.

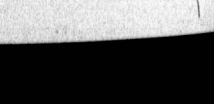
