TEACHERS' SALARIES AND SCHOOL SUPPORT.

The Summerside Pioneer advocates does the school district's contribution. A liberal increase in the salaries of teachers and suggests that the increased amount shall be contributed by the school districts. This accords with what has long been the practice in New Brunswick. In that province each district is required to furnish as much of the teacher's salary as the Government does, be it teacher third-class, second or first class. In addition to this each county must raise a school fund equal to thirty cents per head of population. This, of course comes directly from the pockets of the people, as years or more.

R. L. BORDEN STILL HOLDS THE LEADERSHIP.

It is the usual and correct thing, we believe, for the leader of the Opposition at the opening of the session to formally tender his resignation to the party caucus, with no fear of it being accepted, and still less desire that it shall be. This year the Opposition have met in caucus and adjourned without this little formality being observed. Perhaps the formal offering may be made later, in any rate, it would now seem that Mr Borden's leadership is secure for the present. He may not offer his resignation. If he does tender it, the party will not accept. There is no real rival in sight. Mr. Monk is not British enough. Mr. Foster is impossible. Sir John Hilbert is threatening to vote Liberal at a provincial election. There is no one else to be thought of except young Premier McBride, who is just now very busy with a more or less doubtful election. Wherefore and because of his honorable record, pleasing personality and fair ability Mr Borden will hold on to the leadership—and the \$7,000 salary.

SUGGESTIONS TO TEMPERANCE SOCIETIES.

After the close of the summer activities in business and during the long winter evenings it is usual for the organized temperance bodies such as the Sons of Temperance, The Good Templars and other societies to enter upon renewed activity. We trust that the present year may prove no exception to the general rule in that regard. The season is propitious for cultivating the social and fraternal virtues and for mutual improvement at the weekly meetings. But there are also other obligations devolving upon the temperance organizations, and upon all temperance men, whether they are or not members of any society. That duty is to support, and as far as may be to aid in the enforcement of the Prohibitory Law. It was at the request of the Temperance people that this law was placed upon the statute book and has been from time to time since strengthened and improved. Not all of our legislators are themselves total abstainers, but in deference to the strong temperance sentiment in the country, these men, of both parties joined together to make the sale of liquor for drinking purposes illegal. In addition the Government has appointed prosecutors to assist in the enforcement of the law and bring the violators to justice. Having reached this stage there has been perhaps a little too much disposition on the part of some good temperance men to rest and be thankful and leave the work wholly to the law itself, or to the prosecutors to enforce it. The prosecutors have a very difficult and not by any means a pleasant task to fulfil. These of them who are faithful to their trust certainly deserve not only the sympathy, but the active support and assistance of the temperance societies and temperance people generally. The enactment of prohibition has not taken away the need of having active temperance organizations in every community. These bodies are still all-important in creating and maintaining the temperance sentiment which is the real strength of the law, and in bringing in recruits from the rising generation to replace the older workers as the latter pass to their final reward or become inactive through age. In addition to these duties each lodge and division ought to be a local vigilance committee to assist the prosecutors in their work. There are some sections where work along these lines might be considerably strengthened, and we hope it will receive needed attention in the near future.

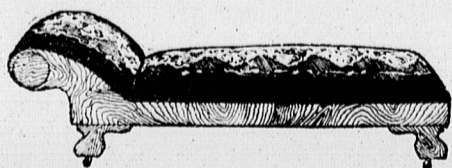
