Everything is in readiness for the fishing season which gets underway this week. Already fresh catches have decorated the dinner tables.

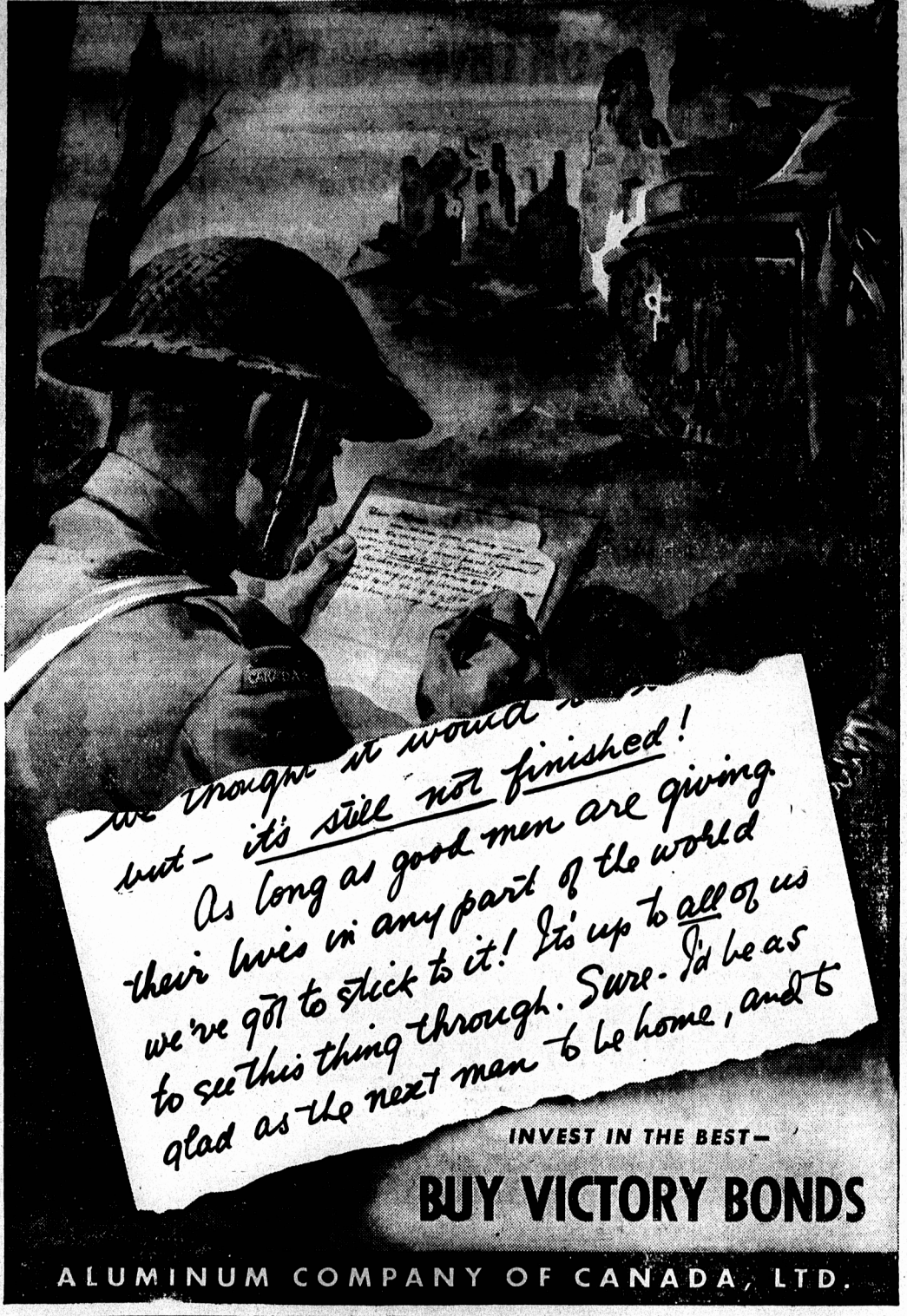
### Reveal British Had Early Sample Of Rocket Bomb

LONDON, April 30 — (CP) — A sample German V-2 rocket bomb was found in Sweden by a United States army transport plane last August, a month before the first rocket fell on England, it was officially disclosed today. The weird looking weapon weighing several tons had fallen virtually intact in June near Kalmar in central Sweden. Swedish scientists were striving to discover the secrets of the new weapon and, after urgent diplomatic negotiations, neutral Sweden agreed to release the rocket, said a statement issued by the office of Brig.-Gen. Earl S. Hog, commander of the Army Transport Command European Division.
