**CELEBRATES FIRST MASS**—Rev. Joseph Douglas MacNeill, who was ordained to the Holy Priesthood by His Excellency Bishop O'Sullivan, on Sunday in St. Paul's Church, Summerside, said his first Mass on Monday morning at 7.30 in St. Paul's Church. At the commencement of the Mass the hymn "Veni Creator" was sung by his six sisters assisted by the Sisters of St. Mary's Convent. Sister Saint Lydia played the organ. During the Mass his sisters chanted hymns. Rev. Dr. McNeill assisted the new priest and his brothers, Masters Bernard and James served the Mass. About one hundred of the congregation took part.

**RECORD AUCTION**—At Mill Valley when the estate of Edwards & Co., Ltd., was offered the largest farm auction ever seen in this Province was held on Saturday afternoon and was a grand success. The five farms were knocked down to W. E. Bentley, representing Tharen Edwards, for \$28,100.00 and comprised 566 acres. Seventeen horses sold at from \$25 to \$125, several cattle, feed, implements and other equipment were auctioned off aggregating \$6000 and bringing the grand total of the sale to \$34,000.00. For five hours Auctioneer High F. Morrison averaged over \$6000 per hour which is not only a record for him in his career of over 25 years auctioneering but probably a record for farm auctions in all Canada. The sale was for cash and the bidding was just as brisk as in the days of "war prices" which shows that there is still a surplus of money in Prince Edward Island. Approximately 2000 people representing various districts in the three counties were present.

**SCHOOL BOARD REQUEST GRANTED**—Dr. E. T. Tanton, chairman of the Summerside School Board, received a letter from Hon. Dr. MacMillan, Minister of Education, yesterday morning granting a third teacher for the 12th grade if required. The text of the letter is as follows: Dr. E. T. Tanton, Chairman of the Summerside School Board: Dear Sir: In answer to your letter of May 6, I may say that it is the opinion of the Board of Education that, with proper rearrangement of your teachers in your higher grades, one additional teacher for Grade XI and one additional teacher for Grade XII would be sufficient, but if it is found necessary that a second teacher in Grade XII must be engaged to carry out your programme the Government will also engage that teacher. Hoping this is satisfactory, I remain, Yours Sincerely, W. J. P. McMillan, Minister of Education.

**OLD LADIES' HOME**—Plans are going ahead for the remodeling of the property on the corner of Pownall St. and Rochford Square to make an Old Ladies' Home. A meeting of the directors was held yesterday afternoon at which proposed changes were discussed. It is intended to accommodate about a dozen persons for the present. On the ground floor to the left of the entrance will be a large dining room back of which will be a pantry, a kitchen and an outside kitchen. On the right of the entrance will be a general sitting room and in the rear a matron's sitting room and a bedroom. The second and third floors will be occupied by bedrooms. The staircase from the second to the third floor will be straightened and a window cut to give better lighting on it. The lot extends all the way to Euston Street and the greater part of it is occupied by a large lawn and garden. Enquiries from prospective residents have already been received although it is not expected the work on the building will be completed for several months. Plans are now being made by Mr. James E. Harris, architect, and it is understood a contract will be let for work.

The regular quarterly session of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met in Zion Church yesterday morning and afternoon, there being a good attendance. Among other matters dealt with was a call to Belfast Church to Rev. D. L. Griffith, who had been supplying this congregation for the past two months. The call was largely signed and was supported by a number of commissioners from the congregation. It was sustained as a regular Gospel call and on being presented to Mr. Griffiths was accepted by him. The date of induction has been set for June 14 at 7.30 p. m.

At the afternoon session a good deal of time was spent discussing the home mission situation, dealing principally with the rearrangement of mission fields and sections of certain congregations. It was announced that Dr. F. Scott MacKenzie, principal of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, is planning a tour of the congregations of the Island in July. The full itinerary will be published later. Mr. V. E. Orsborn was reappointed to the New London congregation for a period of six months. Rev. M. E. Genge, D. D., was also reappointed to Marshfield, Mount Stewart and Highfield pastoral charge for a period of two months. The next quarterly meeting will be held at Malpeque on the third Tuesday of July.

**P. S. S. LITERARY CLUB**—The final meeting for the year of the Prince Street School Literary Society was held yesterday afternoon. As a fitting climax to a fine series of interesting and instructive talks, Dr. Ramsay addressed the society on the work of the three great Greek tragedians, Aeschylus, Sophocles and Euripides. Dr. Ramsay was listened to with the closest attention as he told the story of some of the most famous dramas of all literature, and earned the gratitude of his audience by his scholarly address. Afternoon tea was served by the staff at the conclusion of the lecture.

Citizens learned with regret Sunday evening of the sudden death of Mr. Thomas McMahon, a well known and highly respected resident of this city. **F. W. COLLEGE**—For several days workmen have been engaged in clearing away the ruins of Prince of Wales College. The broken bricks are being spread over the lower part of the grounds. These will be graded over and when the bank at the east side of the college has been cut away the level part of the grounds will be largely increased in size.

At an emergency meeting of the City Council last night a resolution passed at the regular meeting on May 9, granting permission to Mrs. S. P. Duffy to erect a gasoline tank on civic property in front of her store on Richmond Street was rescinded. Motion to rescind the previous resolution was made after discussion by Coun. Trainor, seconded by Coun. Holman, and carried without dissent.

**CELEBRATES HIS FIRST SOLEMN HIGH MASS**—The newly ordained priest, Rev. J. P. Emmett O'Hanley celebrated his first solemn High Mass in St. Peter's Church, St. Peter's Bay, on Sunday, May 8th. He was attended by Rev. Raymond McKenzie St. Dunstan's University as deacon and by the pastor, Rev. A. McLaughlin as subdeacon. A very able sermon appropriate to the occasion was preached by Father McKenzie. In his discourse he eloquently reviewed the history of the institution of the holy priesthood pointing out the goodness and love of God in his relation with mankind throughout the ages. Concluding the speaker congratulated the young priest for co-operating with God's grace and accepting a life of service in the Sanctuary. He also congratulated his good pastor, his parents, and the people of the parish in giving this new priest to the church. After the service Father O'Hanley was presented with a purse and an address.

A serious accident occurred about 7.30 yesterday morning a half-mile from Bonshaw village. Mr. Frank Malone of Green Bay, accompanied by his brother Patrick was on his way to the home of his bride-to-be, Miss Johanna McGaughey, preceding the wedding, which was to have taken place yesterday morning at Kelly's Cross.

Mr. Malone was driving a Ford touring car and while going down a steep descent this side of Bonshaw the right front tire blew out causing the car to turn completely over finally coming to rest in an upright position on the left side of the road. The occupants were thrown to the road and knocked unconscious where they were found by Mr. John McManus, who lived nearby.

An ambulance was called from Charlottetown and the driver of the car brought to the City Hospital where he remained unconscious until last evening when he lapsed into a semi-conscious state. The principal injury is a fracture of the skull. Citizens of Summerside were shocked and deeply grieved yesterday morning to learn that Mrs. Creelman McArthur had passed away that morning at five o'clock in the Civic Hospital at Ottawa.

According to a telegram received by her sister, Mrs. M. F. Schurman of Summerside yesterday morning, Mrs. McArthur had been taken ill with the flu on Sunday. She was taken to the Civic hospital on Tuesday evening and took a turn for the worse at three o'clock Wednesday morning and passed peacefully away two hours later.

Mrs. McArthur with her two daughters left on May 2nd for Ottawa for the closing session of the House and was in perfect health and spirits, looking forward to the pleasant social activities at Ottawa. Her sudden and untimely death at the comparatively early age of 57 when in the midst of life is a distinct shock to her family and many friends both on the Island and at Ottawa.

Mrs. Hannah Lois McArthur was born in Summerside and was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs.

Thomas Beattie of Summerside. For many years she taught at the Summerside High School. Except for visits made to other parts of Canada, United States and Europe, she lived her life in her home town where she was very highly esteemed.

She was a woman of charming personality and was a delightful hostess. The many social functions given by her at Ottawa as wife of a member of the Upper House were always looked forward to with pleasure by all.

In her duties as hostess she met many notable personages and made many lasting friendships. In Summerside she was always willing to help in every good cause. She was a member of the Christian Church and prominent in the different societies in connection with church work. She was prominent in the work of the Daughters of the Empire and was Regent of the Summerside branch a few years ago. She also was a member of the Ladies Aid of the Prince County Hospital and furnished a room at her own expense.

She will be very much missed by a wide circle of friends throughout the Island. The deepest sympathy is extended to Senator McArthur and his family in their sudden bereavement. There are left to mourn besides her husband, four daughters, Mrs. G. E. Pope of Summerside; Mrs. Benj. Rogers, (Jr.) of Charlottetown and Miss Constance and Miss Mollie at home; also three grandchildren, Master George and Miss Mary Pope, and Miss Valorie Rogers; also two sisters, Mrs. M. F. Schurman of Summerside, and Miss Grace Beattie of Somerville, Mass.; and one brother, John K. Beattie of Somerville.

The funeral will be held from her late residence on Spring Street, Summerside, on Saturday at 2 p. m.

**MOUNT A. ALUMNI BANQUET**—The annual banquet and meeting of the Mount Allison Alumni Society was held last evening at the Canadian National Hotel. A splendid meal was served by the hotel after which a musical program interspersed by speeches made a very pleasant evening for all present. Mr. C. H. **MADE LENGTHY VOYAGE**—Mr. M. A. (Sandy) MacLeod, Euston Street, returned home this week after an interesting experience on board the C. G. S. "Highlander." Mr. MacLeod joined the ship at Halifax last December, and sailed with her for New Zealand and Australia by way of the Panama Canal. After discharging cargo at Australia and returning via Panama Canal, calls were made at Gulf Port, Mississippi, Lake Port, Louisiana, and at New York, Boston and Montreal. Mr. MacLeod, who is a son of Mrs. M. E. Genge, Marshfield, looks bronzed and fit after the voyage and speaks enthusiastically of the standard of service and discipline maintained in the Government marine service.

**LARGE BUTTERFLIES**—Two magnificently colored butterflies, each with wingspread of about five inches, were shown to the Guardian staff yesterday by Mr. R. V. McIntyre, of St. Avars. The cocoons had been found adhering to a thornbush last fall, and were kept by Mr. McIntyre all winter, from whence they emerged through small apertures yesterday morning. They seem now to be fully grown and their size and gorgeously patterned wings suggested the Tropics rather than this Province. It would be interesting to have an expert opinion as to the variety to which they belong.

The deceased had been ailing for some time, an illness which bore with patience. There passed away on April 23rd at her home, North Rustico, Mrs. John McLure, who before her marriage was Carolyn Amelia Woolner, daughter of the late Chester Woolner, who although cut off in the prime of life was regarded in his day as a man of exceptional ability. Her husband who pre-deceased her thirty-three years ago is still remembered by many as a man of most kindly disposition and high sense of honor. He served in the American Civil War, being one of the Guard chosen for General Grant when General Lee surrendered to the former. Although attaining unto the age of 87 years, Mrs. McLure had retained her faculties to the end and her passing was symbolic of her life lived here on earth, serene and beautiful, speaking of the meeting with her husband and friends. To the many who visited the home was extended the kindest of hospitality and one was ever sure of a most gracious welcome. Her interest in Canada's political life which she had followed closely for long years was very marked and Canadian literature and periodicals were very dear to her being a great reader all her life.

Early in life she united with the Cavendish Presbyterian Church and all down through the years remained a faithful and staunch supporter of the church in all its activities. All those who knew her revered and loved her and to those left it is a grand tradition to carry on that their lives may be as noble and unselfish as hers. During her declining years her constant companion and devoted nurse was her daughter Miss Lucy McLure who gave up her profession as school teacher in Western Canada to be with her Mother.

Those of her family left to cherish her memory are: Mr. John A. MacMillan, Charlottetown; Mrs. Colin C. McLure, Brackley Point; Mr. W. Chester S. McLure, M. P., and at home Mr. Russell A. McLure and Miss Lucy. Also one sister Mrs. Wesley Paynter, North Rustico and one brother Mr. Conrobert Woolner, Boston. The funeral which was held on Thursday, April 26th, was very largely attended by relatives and friends of the family.

The fox breeders at the meeting felt that as the association assured them that all was being done that could be done, they did not see the necessity of forming a new organization at present to deal with the matter.
