SOVIETS' CAUSE LOSING GROUND IN RUSSIA

LONDON, August 15.—The Soviet government has issued a proclamation declaring that the Russians are in danger, according to telegrams from Helsinki, received in Stockholm and quoted by the correspondent

of the Times there. The Petrograd Soviet has removed to Kronstadt because of insecurity. Dozens of armed peasants are reported marching on Petrograd from surrounding districts. They declare they are starving, and that the Red Guards have stolen all their food. Dissatisfaction with the Soviets is prevalent in Russia.

3,000,000 U.S. TROOPS BY JUNE 30.

WASHINGTON, August 15.—In reporting the administration man-power bill extending draft ages today Chairman Chamberlain disclosed to the Senate that General March, chief of staff had told the Militia Committee it was

up to the United States to put enough men in France to win the war on the western front. The report revealed that the new American war program calls for eighty divisions or something over 3,000,000 men in France by June 30 next year, with eighteen more divisions in training at home then.
