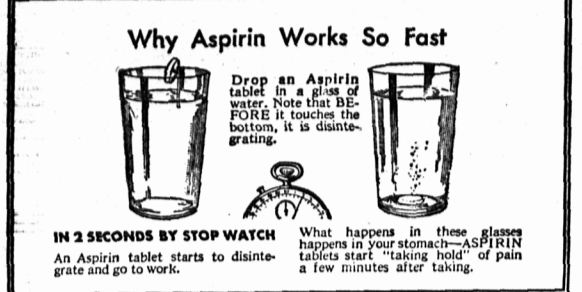

Sarnia Called To Go Through Big Four Rugby

(By Elmer Dulmage, Canadian Press Staff Writer) TORONTO, Sept. 24.—By The Canadian Press.—Sarnia may be just another autumn of conquest for the football bon-toms of the east's Intercollegiate and Interprovincial unions. Or it may be a far more lively and upsetting affair than that. It may be the autumn when fond hopes are not trampled under foot.

On the outskirts of the big football spotlight, clearing down on the doings of the Big Four and the college circuit, Sarnia Imperials will be driving towards their fourth straight Ontario Rugby Football Union title in comparative semi-darkness. This will be the people's choice for the national championship.

Regardless of the fact the people will be playing to watch Argonauts, Montreal, Ottawa and Hamilton McGill, Western, Toronto and Queen's, the Imperials will be the hot favorites. They will be left strictly alone, except by the O. R. F. U. faithful, however, until late in November. That is the custom.

According to the popular conception, Sarnia will win the O. R. F. U. title in "war" as they did last season. So there will be no rush to the turnstiles while this mighty brigade is playing such foes as Balmy Beach, St. Michael's College and Hamilton Cubs. When Imperials have qualified for the Dominion playdowns will be time enough.

Hamilton Tigers knocked off Sarnia in the eastern final two years ago by a scant margin. It was a terrific struggle. Argonauts defeated this O. R. F. U. machine in the national final last December by 4-3 and admit defeat. And the better champion the east crowns will be no top-heavy favorite in the west.

There is definitely danger on every side for the big teams that emerge from the Interprovincial and Intercollegiate races. It will be no great surprise if Sarnia sweeps through the O. R. F. U. and the eastern playdowns without defeat. And whoever champion the east crowns will be no top-heavy favorite in the west.

For shorter journeys, the C.N.R. is providing numerous short limit special fare excursions, as well as low fares for trips extending over longer periods and week-ends.
