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GRAND DIVISION QUARTIRLY MEETING AT FREDERICTON

NATIONAL DIVISION TO MEET HERE
JULY 10-11

The postponed Quarterly Session of the Grand Division, Sons of Temperance of Prince Edward Island, was held in Fredericton on Thursday, May 16 with a larger representation than usual from the various divisions.

The Grand Worthy Patriarch, Rev. Bro. W. S. Loring, Cape Wolfe, presided in his usual capable manner. After the usual regular business was dispensed with, the need of an organizer to canvass communities re Temperance Education was discussed. We feel, said the speaker, that unless the youth of our land are educated along this line, we will not accomplish a great deal. This education may be secured in our Subordinate Divisions, where both young and old, rich and poor, and all denominations may gather each week, and partake of good and wholesome amusement, such as Temperance instruction, Literary and Debating evenings, Social times, etc. In fact the programmes of our divisions are not excelled in any other society. Our object is to place a society of this kind in as many communities as possible. Why not help us. Remember, please, that if we are careless or indifferent about this question, our future boys and girls are going to pay for our negligence. Think it over well.

Considerable discussion took place over the coming visit of the National Division of North America to Charlottetown, July 10th and 11th of this year. We expect to see about one hundred delegates from various parts of Canada and the United States at this gathering in July. You may be a delegate also, by linking up with the Division in your community. If there is no Sons of Temperance organization in your community, and you desire one, please communicate with the Grand Scribe, G. Emerson Huestis, Wilmot Valley, without delay, for you cannot miss our Session in Charlottetown on July 10th and 11th.

Some time ago, an appeal for funds was sent to our Subordinate Divisions, to assist us in our work. The result has been very pleasing. Star of Hope Division, Cape Wolfe, handing us a contribution of forty dollars in Fredericton. May the good work continue.


The Committee on the State of the order, brought in the following report:

- "We the members of the Grand Division deem it a great pleasure to hold this Quarterly Session with Refuge Division and to find that they are still the banner Division in our Province. We regret that owing to weather conditions, etc., our Session was postponed twice, and hope that those who came to Fredericton on the other days, will, with the good friends in Fredericton reason the whole matter out in love, knowing that everything was done for the best under the circumstances.
- "We agree with the Grand Worthy Patriarch in his suggestion on agency work, and we would suggest that an organizer be engaged, and work begun at as early a date as possible, and that our subordinate divisions be called upon for further contributions to finance this work.
- Regarding the matter of the "Forward" mentioned by the G. W. P., we would suggest also that each member subscribe for the said paper, and also that a report of our session be published in same.
- Regarding vote to be taken in

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July, we would urge the need of devoting all our support in lining up all the Temperance forces for action as suggested by our G. W. P. and would suggest that a committee be appointed to confer with the Executive of the Temperance Alliance.

5. We realize that in a few weeks, we will have the National Division meet with us, and we would request a further financial aid from each Division to assist us in carrying out our part of the programme, such as procuring badges, providing entertainment, etc.

6. We join, with the G. W. P. in appreciation of the services of our Grand Scribe, and ask that each and every member of our order assist him in his endeavors for the advancement of our cause.

- That we call into action all of the public speakers who may come to the meeting of the National Division in Charlottetown, July 10th and 11th and that we ask them to assist us in the public meetings to be held throughout the Island before the election to be held July 18th.
- That we do all in our power to have our electors realize what a curse and a disgrace it would be to have the system of Government Control in force in the fair Province of Prince Edward Island which has for so many years held proudly aloft the banner of Prohibition.
