At Webster's Corner the new meadows are looking well, the grass showing no indication of being winter killed. A good deal of the early wheat has been sown, some farmers having as much as five acres in this crop. For other grain crops the ground has been made ready, but the soil is yet too damp for sowing. The East River Cheese Factory will open on the first of June. The prospects are for a full supply of milk, the dairy stock being in fine condition. Michael McDonald has a four-year old stallion, a Woodburn blood, which is very much admired, giving promise of speed. Hugh Cumiskey lost a valuable horse, from inflammation a few days ago. Much sympathy is felt for him among his neighbors and friends, the animal being worth \$150.

On account of the busy season there was but a fair City market yesterday. Potatoes sold at thirty cents a bushel, white oats at fifty to fifty-three and black at fifty to fifty-five cents. There was choice butter at twenty-two to twenty-four cents per lb, while eggs were down to seven-teen and eighteen cents per doz. The hay and straw market was dull. Straw pressed sold at five fifty per ton and hay pressed, at eight fifty. Straw loose was thirty to thirty-five cents per cwt. and hay at forty-five to fifty cents. Pork was plentiful at eight to nine cents per lb.

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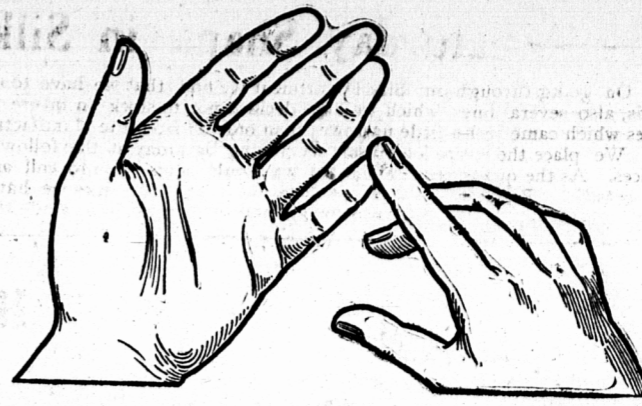
