## SEVEN MILLION DOLLARS IN CANADIAN GRAIN SHIPMENTS TO ENGLAND DURING AUGUST

MONTREAL, Sept. 27.—"You may take it from me that Britain and her allies are getting all the food supplies they need at the present time, and I have not the least doubt they will continue to get them," said an official who is closely in touch with Canadian shipments this morning.

Incidentally, he stated that the larger part of the Dominion's gift of flour, as well as a large part of the various gifts in kind of the provinces, either have reached England or are on the way. But these gifts, considerable as they are, are only a very small portion of the vast imperial trade in foodstuffs that is now flowing from the St. Lawrence to British and friendly Continental ports. The figures quoted following illustrate this.

Down to August 27, an for the month of August alone, there were shipped from Montreal for ports in the United Kingdom, a total of 6,974,015 bushels of wheat, worth \$6,918,966. This is beside half a million bushels of oats, 175,000 bushels of barley, and 96,647 bags of flour, the latter item worth \$274,548. To French ports there went 1,392,029 bushels of wheat, and 53,000 bushels of oats. For wheat alone \$366,044 bushels were shipped to British and French ports from the port of Montreal. And this is all since the declaration of war.

For the week from August 27 to September 3, there were 1,110,661 bushels of wheat shipped from Montreal for England, and 407,028 bushels for France. Of flour 78,238 bags went to England, to the value of \$229,531. Over a hundred thousand bushels of oats went to British and over 320,000 bushels to French ports in this one week. An interesting shipment to Havre on one boat recently was over 13,000 bales of hay.

## BRITISH NOBLES KILLED IN ACTION

LONDON, Sept. 27.—It is officially reported that the Major the Honorable Alfred Maitland, of the Cameron Highlanders, aged 42, the youngest son of Lord Lauderdale, and Lieutenant Sir G. A. Waine Baillie, of the Royal Scotch Greys, aged 21, were killed in action. Lieutenant Sir Roland Corbet, of a well known Shropshire family, and Captain the Honorable Chas Monk, of the Coldstream Guards, aged 37, son and heir of Viscount Monk, were wounded.

### ALL IN A NAME.

## VIRGINIA DRY BY A BIG MAJORITY

RICHMOND, Va., Sept. 27.—While complete returns from the State-wide prohibition election are lacking, figures received yesterday showed that the voters had placed Virginia in the "dry" column by a majority of more than 32,835. The result of the election means that on and after November 1, 1916, Virginia will be "dry." The General Assembly which meets in regular session in January of that year will enact laws to govern the State under prohibition.

### CHURNING TEMPERATURE.

The temperature at which cream should be churned should be determined by a trial churning of at about 54 degrees F. If the butter comes quickly and is soft churn at a lower temperature next time. If it comes

firm and requires a long time to churn, a higher temperature should be used next time.

The churning temperature will be effected by the following factors:

1. The hardness or softness of the butter fat. Feed, breed and individuality determine hardness or softness

of butter fat.

2. Amount of ripening. Sour cream may be churned at a higher temperature than sweet cream.
3. Temperature cream was held at previous to churning. High temperature in ripening and holding requires lower temperature in churning.

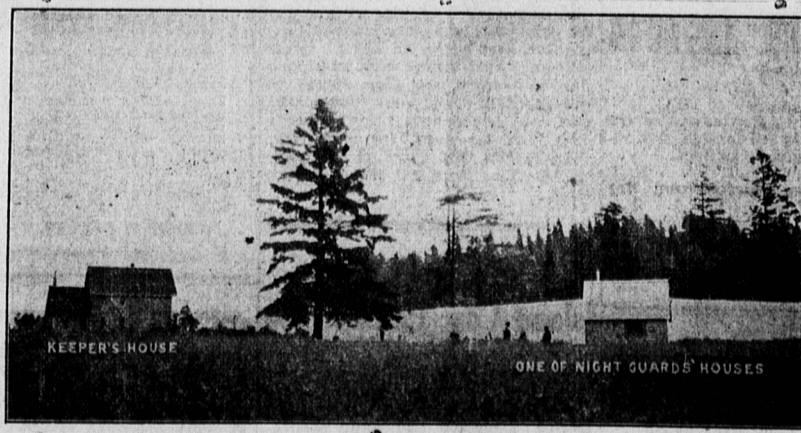

## Description of Ranch

It is not much wonder that he is called the "Wizard Rancher."

## Description of Foxes
