## MacNider May Be Next U. S. Vice President

(By Ken Clark, Canadian Press Staff Writer)

CHICAGO, June 15—Hanford MacNider, Minister to Ottawa, may be the next Vice-President of the United States. While it remains probable Vice-President Charles Curtis will be renominated with Mr. Hoover by the Republican National Convention which began a spiritless session here today, there is a sustained sentiment among the delegates against the 73-year-old Kansan.

If it comes to choosing a younger and more adroit politician, as a running mate for Mr. Hoover, General Charles Gates Daves, ex-Ambassador to Great Britain and ex-Vice-President, has the best chance of nomination. Then comes Pat Hurley, Secretary of War, Walter Edge, Ambassador to France, Senator Walcott, of Connecticut, a confidant of the White House, Col. MacNider and others. Once it is evident the delegates will not go for Curtis, the field is open.

## Newfoundland's Outlook Is Most Encouraging

OTTAWA, June 15—(By The Canadian Press)—Newfoundland's delegation to the Imperial Conference in Ottawa next month is expected to be headed by Hon. F. C. Alderdice, Premier-elect and leader of the Newfoundland United party. Two other ministers in the new government will probably accompany Mr. Alderdice to the Ottawa party.

The work of the sub-committees preparing for the conference is continuing. Meetings will likely be held tomorrow with Prime Minister R. B. Bennett present.

J. F. Darling, eminent British economist and Director of the Midland Bank, arrived in the capital late tonight from London, England, to render any assistance in connection with the currency question which will come up at the conference. He is here on his own initiative.

Interviewed tonight, Mr. Alderdice spoke as follows:

"I regard the results as a notable and impressive victory won by the people of Newfoundland. It is conclusive of the country's intention to set its house in order and to show the rest of the Empire and the world in general its firm intention to face its difficulties with determination and courage and overcome them. It is an unmistakable demand for honest and efficient administration. To this I and my party are pledged and to give them this we should do our utmost. With such a mandate, the party which I have the honor to lead, finds new inspiration for the task that has been entrusted to us, and by the application of the progressive indus-
