Pakistan Family Finds New Home Full Of Wonders

OTTAWA, Nov. 21—(CP)—She is so eager to find out more about Canada, that the Begum Mohammed Ali has quite forgotten to be lonely for her faraway homeland. "I have much to learn about your country." The tiny, dark-haired wife of Pakistan's high commissioner to Canada spread her arms to indicate the amount. "There is so many things that are new to me."
To date this quiet-spoken, but enthusiastic young woman hasn't done badly. In the few weeks since she has accompanied her husband to his new appointment in Ottawa, the Begum has done a bit of travelling — chiefly in Southwestern Ontario and to Niagara Falls, which she exclaims is one of the finest sights she has ever come across. In addition she has seen some football and hockey, and has come to the conclusion that she prefers the latter.
"It is fast," she said. Her brown eyes sparkled as she recalled how "very exciting" she found her first hockey game.
Canadian football was not at all like the football played in Pakistan. "What you call 'soccer' is more like our football," she explained.
The interview with the high commissioner's wife took place in the pleasant drawing-room of the Pakistan residence in suburban Rockcliffe, a room furnished in bright colors and along modern lines. Distance and difficulty of travel has not made it feasible for Mrs. Ali to bring many of her own furnishings to this country.
Home Is Colorful
Yellow curtains create an effect of sunshine in this room, even in the dulllest weather. The carpet is of soft green — the Begum's favorite shade, not necessarily because it is the Pakistan color, but because it has so many beautiful tones.
The conversation turned to the Canadian climate and Mrs. Ali recalled how surprised she was upon arriving here last summer to find the weather exactly as it was at home.
But temperatures in Pakistan don't drop below 45 degrees at any time during the winter, and she is prepared for a colder season in Canada. In fact she is even looking forward to it with interest.
However, not any more so than her two young sons, 11-year-old Hammad, and nine-year-old Hamde.
"Early every morning they come running to me and ask 'Mummy' will there be any snow today?" She laughed. "You know they have never seen snow before, and they are looking forward to it."
The boys are rapidly falling in to Canadian ways. They attend Ashbury College, a boys' private

school in Ottawa, and already have picked up several new games. Both have cowboy suits, and are learning to "twirl" their guns, western style.
The Begum raised her hands from the folds of the pastel-toned sari she wore, and attempted to imitate their motion. "It seems a very popular game in your country — this game of cowboys," she said.
