THE marriage took place recently at Fall River, Mass. of Fred L. Merry, formerly of Charlottetown, and Jennie M. Copeland of 211 Thames Street, Newport R. I. The ceremony was performed by Rev. W. Smith of the Church of the Ascension.

R. V. DIMOCK, manager of the Royal Bank of Canada in this city, has been transferred to the inspection staff with headquarters at Halifax. He leaves for there next week. Mr. Dimock will be succeeded by J. Francis McMillan, manager of the Royal Bank at Summerside.

TODAY being All Saints Day there will be the following services in St. Peter's Cathedral: Holy Communion, 7.15 a. m. (in chapel) and at 7.45 a. m. (in church). Matins at 8.15. Evensong 5 p. m. Memorial service and sermons at 7.30 p. m. Collections throughout the day for St. Peter's Cemetery Fund.

THE Guardian has received a copy of the Winnipeg Telegram in which is given a full description of The Western Canada Flour Mills Co. Ltd. Manufacturers of "Purity" flour, who have just completed their new mills at Winnipeg. These mills are very extensive having a capacity for turning out 7,300 barrels of flour every twenty-four hours. The plant consists of three buildings, a mill, storage elevator, and a warehouse, all of which are fitted up with the latest modern machinery and improvements. The firm have decided to adopt for the future a universal brand for their flour from the Atlantic to the Pacific, instead of using one brand in the Maritime Provinces and another in Western Canada as in the past, and have registered the brand "Purity" for that purpose. Notwithstanding all the labor saving devices, the mills employ over 100 men, and is considered the nearest perfection in the world, and its products are sold all over the world. The firm's Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia representative is Thos. Flannaghan with headquarters at Truro.

At a meeting of the Executive of the Local Government held on Tuesday evening Matthew Smith M. L. A. was appointed a member to fill the place of Hon George Simpson. Mr. Smith was present and attended the meeting. An agreement between the Prince Edward Island Railway and the Government was ratified with regard to a management of Hillsborough Bridge. Between the Railway department and the Government sufficient men and safeguards are to be provided to make the passage of the bridge as safe as possible. The Market House at Summerside is to be used as a Court House till the new Court House is erected. The vault in the Summerside Post Office is to be at the disposal of the Local Government for safe keeping of records etc. Estimates are to be obtained for the erection of a Jail to be used for the whole Province. Henry Smith, of this city was appointed a member of the School Board in the place of the late Dr. Taylor. Mrs. W. A. Hawley and Mrs. J. E. B. McCreedy were appointed a committee to inspect the accommodations for women and children in the jail, Falowood Asylum and the Poorhouse. This is in accordance with the request of the Local Council of Women, the first appointee, being Mrs. C. C. Gardner, who has resigned. Reports were read regarding the destruction of Government books and documents in the fire at Summerside. The formal report of the Conference of Provincial Premiers was submitted by Premier Peters and approved. Robert F. Lord, of Tryon, has been appointed road Inspector of District No. 8, Prince Co., and Peter P. McGowan of Hope River has been appointed a Commissioner for taking acknowledgments of deeds.
