**MORE SEIZURES OF SHIPS.**

It is to be expected that there will be more seizures of ships by the Russian fleet as there have already been, in fact, since it was agreed that the S. S. Malacca should be given up. It can hardly be that Russia has promised not to make further searches or seizures. That would be too much to expect, and would be in effect an abdication of her rights as a nation. No doubt what has been agreed upon is that no vessel shall be seized and sent to a prize court without a strong prima facie case has been first made out against her for carrying contraband goods. It may be that there were contraband goods on board the Malacca, although the shot, shell and munitions of war which she had on board were the property of the British Government and not intended for the use of the Japanese armies or ships.

There is little doubt that quantities of contraband goods have been carried from Europe to Japan in neutral ships since the war began five or six months ago, and the greater part of this under the British flag. Half the commerce of the seas carries the Union Jack, and an even larger proportion of the carrying trade to and from the East is done in British ships. Once the Russian fleet was shut up at Port Arthur the way was open for this contraband trade. It was a very profitable trade so long as there were no Russian war vessels, regular or irregular, to search and seize the carriers. Japan has been all along receiving supplies for her army and navy from Europe, Australia, America and even Canada, to the amount of millions of dollars. So has Russia in like manner.

All this trade has been illegal, carried on in violation of international law and in violation of the proclamations of neutrality by which all the neutral Governments had warned their people. This trade in contraband goods is on a par with smuggling and blockade running. It involves confiscation of the goods if they are found on the high seas by the commissioned ships of one of the belligerent powers. Both Japan and Russia have encouraged this trade, buying what they wanted wherever they could get it. Chicago has done a trade amounting to millions with both belligerents in canned meats and vegetables. For Russia these supplies have been shipped across the Atlantic to Russian ports and thence carried to the East by the Siberian Railway. Japan has no warships on the Atlantic to seize them. Contraband goods sent to Japan have gone by way of the Mediterranean, Suez Canal, and the Red Sea. Russia has a right to intercept this traffic if she can do so in a lawful way, anywhere on its route. So has Japan the right to intercept contraband on its way to Russia ports.

We ought not to sympathize with this trade in contraband goods, or to complain if it is intercepted in a lawful way. It is justly complained that the status of the Russian ships making the seizures in the Red Sea is irregular. But there is at least behind the volunteer fleet such official recognition and commission as raises them above the rank of pirates. The basic fact at the bottom of the entire business is that the trade in contraband goods is irregular, unlawful and

ought to be stopped. Perhaps this side of the case has not received the attention it deserves. It is no insult to the British flag when a vessel which it covers, but engaged in contraband trade is seized by the ship of a belligerent. No national Government can afford to be found protesting contraband trade by a show of force, or by diplomatic threats. Britain cannot afford to take such a position. But if the lawful trade of a neutral nation is unlawfully interfered with, then reparation may be demanded and enforced if necessary at the cannon's mouth.

The next time you enter a saloon or bar-room during business hours it will cost you twenty dollars, with the privilege of leaving, and the third time it will cost you the privilege of leaving.

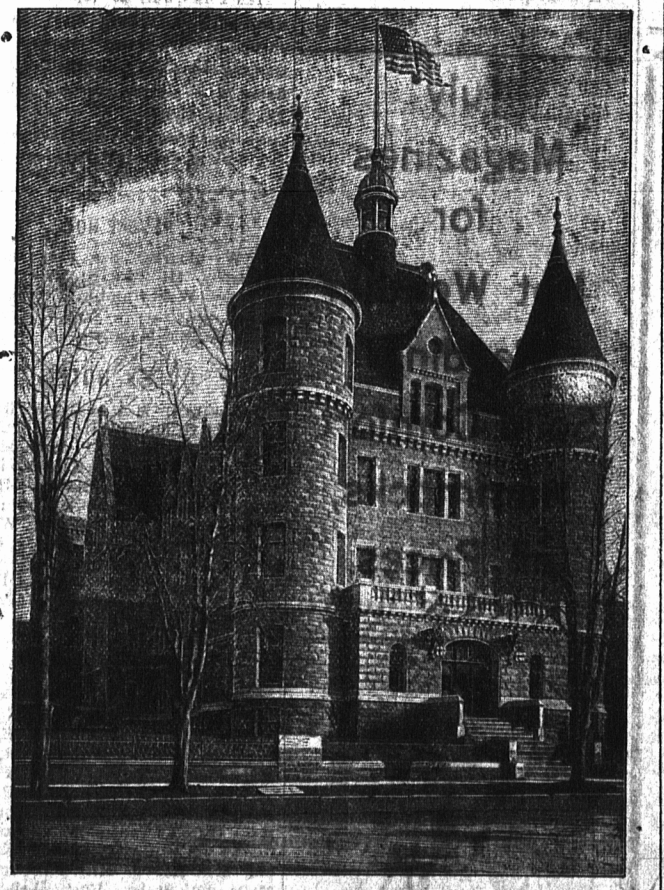
