## DUTY ON FOREIGN MANUFACTURES

LONDON, February 23.—The Daily Mail, in view of the necessity of raising money for the war in South Africa, advocates a tariff for a revenue purpose, which it says differs entirely from a protective tariff, the virtues and vices of which it is needless to discuss, although the speed and precision with which Russia has brought the United States to their knees by retaliation are most instructive. It suggests a ten per cent. ad valorem duty on foreign manufactures. This suggestion will probably find considerable support, in view of the almost certain increase of the income tax.

## HOME FROM THE S. AFRICAN WAR

### Canada's Soldiers of the Queen Receive a Warm Reception

## MAJOR WEEKS AND CORPL. BROWN ARRIVE

### And Seated in a Sleigh are Drawn to the Drill Shed by a Detachment of Engineers—Welcome Extended by Premier Farquharson, Chief Justice Sullivan, Mayor Warburton, Lieut.-Governor McIntyre, Rev. T. F. Fullerton and Responded to by Major Weeks and Corpl. Brown.

Then here's good luck To Johnny Cannuck. When he comes marching home again. During the morning bulletins posted throughout the city announced the arrival of Major Weeks and Corpl. Brown at Georgetown and that the special train which had gone to the eastern capital at 9:30 would arrive in the city at 2:10. As the train pulled into the station the crowd promised to almost equal in magnitude and enthusiasm that which greeted the return of the other members of the contingent. The parade was possibly the central feature of the demonstration and

well performed. He was sure that he expressed the opinion of all when he extended a hearty welcome. Mayor Warburton on behalf of the city welcomed the returning soldiers and thought that the Imperial officers had made a mistake when they permitted Major Weeks to return. While in England some months ago he had been told that the Canadians were the best soldiers in Africa and that was the version of persons competent to give an opinion. Lieut.-Governor McIntyre after welcoming the returning volunteers referred to the manner in which Canada had been brought before the world and that fame, he contended, had been acquired through the instrumentality of her soldiers. Rev. T. F. Fullerton was glad to hear the expressions of welcome from the speakers who had preceded him. He regretted, however, that the men from this province had not been rewarded as in other places. Major Weeks then thanked those present for the magnificent reception tendered. In consequence of his late arrival he had not thought of a reception and the proceedings of today had been all the more pleasing. After paying a tribute to the Contingent, he expressed special gratitude to Corporal Brown for the way he stayed by him, when people were dying all around him of enteric fever. Corporal Brown then briefly thanked all for the reception given Major Weeks and himself and expressed pleasure at being home. Three cheers and a tiger were given for the King and the 4th Regiment C. A. Band played the National Anthem. Three cheers and a tiger were proposed for Major Weeks and Corpl. Brown and the hearty response evidenced the popularity of both gentlemen. "For they are Jolly Good Fellows" by the band brought the proceedings to a close. The parade was composed of Engineers Artillery, No. 1 Co. 82nd Reg. all under command of Capt. Hooper.

After entering the drill shed the men were drawn up in line and addressed by Premier Farquharson, Chief Justice Sullivan, Mayor Warburton, Lieut. Governor McIntyre, Col. Moore and Rev. T. F. Fullerton. Premier Farquharson on behalf of the province extended a hearty welcome to Major Weeks and Corpl. Brown and expressed his personal pleasure in seeing their safe return after an arduous campaign. Chief Justice Sullivan expressed great pleasure at being present on the occasion of the return of Major Weeks and Corpl. Brown. ## THE THIRD ANNUAL CONVENTION OF KENSINGTON D. S. S. ASSOCIATION.

### Convention of Kensington D. S. S. Association.

## PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

### At Malpeque on Tuesday, Feb. 19th.—A Profitable Session Held.

The third Annual Convention of the Kensington District S. S. Association was held in the Presbyterian Church at Malpeque, on Tuesday, Feb. 19th with a large number of representatives and visitors in attendance and the following officers: Pres. H. B. Baker; First Vice, Mr. G. P. McNutt; Sec'y., Miss F. Durant; Treas., Mrs. T. Tuplin; also the Provincial Field Sec'y., Rev. G. P. Raymond.

The afternoon session was opened with half-an-hour's devotional exercises led by the Vice, then the President took the chair and the different items of business were gone through. The roll call showed that out of the 16 schools in the district, seven were represented. They were as follows: Malpeque by Mr. Thos. McNutt and Mrs. Lewis Henry; Baltic, by Messrs. T. Donalds and Geo. Bearist; Darnley by Messrs. G. P. McNutt and Charles McKay; Misses Mary McNutt and Christy McKay; Margate, by Pres. Sec'y., Treas., Mrs. Pound, Messrs. Effe, Glydon and Dennis; Kensington, [Pres.] by Messrs. Brown and T. Casely; Misses. Janet and Jane Glover; Long River, by Messrs. Barnett and Johnson; Hamilton, by Messrs. H. Stewart and Jas. Ramsey, Misses. Simpson and Jessie Crozier. The Treasurer's report was given and adopted. The Nominating Committee consisting of Rev. J. M. Fisher, Messrs. T. McNutt, Glydon, Johnson and Casely, recommended as follows, and on motion their report was adopted: Pres.—Mr. Henry Stewart, Hamilton. 1st Vice—Mr. H. R. Baker, Margate. 2nd Vice—Mr. John Johnson, Long River. Sec'y.—Miss Fairlie Durant, Margate. An Additional Executive—Mr. Albert Craig Emerald, and Mr. William Brown, Margate.

The retiring President made a few appropriate remarks, after which the new president took the chair, and called on Rev. Mr. Raymond. He spoke first of the object of this Convention, which is two-fold in its nature.—1st—Improvement in S. S. work.—2nd—Extension of S. S. work, which latter may be accomplished in two ways.—by keeping schools open all the year round, and by organizing new schools in districts where there are none. The duty of the president is to visit each school in the district at least once a year. He then spoke of Normal work. It also is dual in its nature—1st.—To be familiar with the Bible. 2nd. To know your scholar, and how to conduct a class. He gave a very interesting blackboard lesson on "The law of teaching," taking up the laws, adaptation, co-operation, definiteness, system, variety, illustration and repetition and enlarging on each one. Rev. J. M. Fisher was then called on. His subject was "The Holy Spirit as a Qualification for the S. S. Worker." He emphasized these particular points. After some minor business session adjourned. The evening meeting was very largely attended, the spacious church being almost filled. The president opened with devotional exercises, then the minutes were read and adopted. The committee on constitutions recommended that the constitution for district organizations as given on page 21 in annual report be adopted with slight alterations. On motion, this was adopted and Rev. W. A. Thompson then gave an address on "The obligations, privileges, and rewards of the S. S. worker." Rev. E. Smith gave an address on "How

## \$2,429.15 FOR MONUMENT

### The Committee Meet and Consider Plans.—Another Appeal to be Made.

A meeting of the Monument Committee was held on Saturday, the 23rd inst., in the Judges' Chambers, the Premier in the chair. The Sec'y. Treasurer reported that the subscriptions to the fund to date amounted to \$2429.15, of which \$2122.20 had been received from Charlottetown and \$306.95 from the country districts. In as much as this amount, even when supplemented by the grants expected from the Local Government and City Council, would be insufficient to enable the Committee to aim at an erection that would be at all creditable to the Province, it was decided to make an appeal for additional subscriptions, which appeal is set forth in the

letter to the editor printed herewith. The plans and estimates received by the secretary were then carefully gone over and considered, and considerable progress made towards obtaining the data necessary to enable the members of the Committee to intelligently appraise the merits of the respective proposals submitted for their consideration. Further information was, however, found necessary and the Secretary was instructed to obtain the same, so that the Committee might be able to lay their report before the public with as little delay as possible. Mr. Antoine Vincent was present at the request of the Committee and gave them much valuable technical information. The meeting adjourned at the call of the chair.
