He leaves to mourn besides his wife, formerly Miss McKinnon, Clearmont, five sons and two daughters, all grown up; also two brothers, Hon. James, at Summerside, Simon, and Ronald, at Aspen, Col., John, in Massachusetts, H. P. at Traveller's Rest, and one sister, Mrs. John Goodwin, Wellington. WIRELESS LAMPLIGHTING.

LONDON, Feb. 14.—William Marconi has furnished another illustration of the facility with which modern science can perform feats surpassing those of the legendary magicians of the Middle Ages. He announces that he can light a lamp by wireless power at a distance of six miles. The bulb of the lamp is attached to a wireless receiver, which is connected in its turn with a receiving aerial wire. In the experiment in question a transmitter was linked up with a 100 horse-power dynamo. As soon as the power was applied, the bulb six miles away was lighted and remained alight as long as the power was kept on.

This experiment Mr. Marconi hopes may be the forerunner of the use of wireless for lighting and heating houses. "At present," he said, "the first call is to push on with wireless telephony. I am now aiming particularly at obtaining a distinctly audible message, which is really more valuable than 'spectacular' calls over long distances. I have been able to communicate quite easily and clearly at 100 miles' distance, using ordinary receivers and apparatus very much like the usual telephone. The difficulty lies with the transmitter, which is very heavy, and needs two men to carry it."

FRENCH AVIATOR FLEW OVER MONT BLANC.

LAOSTE, Department of Isere, France, Feb. 16.—A flight over Mont Blanc in a dense fog at a height of probably three miles was carried out today by Parnelin, a French aviator. He alighted here within a few hundred yards of the town, and related that he had started in the morning from Geneva, where he had been waiting a week for a fine day on which to make the flight. When he rose the weather was splendid, but his aeroplane plunged into a thick fog on the French side of the Alps.
