ANNUAL MEETING OF ABEGWEITS LAST NIGHT

The annual meeting of the Abegweit Amateur Athletic Association held last night in the Board of Trade rooms, was fairly well attended, with Councillor T. W. L. Prowse, president of the Club, presiding.

After the minutes, the President and Secretary's reports were read and adopted, the meeting was then thrown open for discussion of the various athletic endeavors of the Association.

President Prowse was the first speaker of the evening. He spoke of the records of the Abegweits on track, field, and ice during the past year, laying particular stress on the work of the younger boys of the organization on track and field. He especially mentioned the fine performances of McCarey, Woodlock, McDonald and Barney Francis, the two latter named athletes, present Canadian champions of the broad jump and mile run respectively.

The recent football game between the Abegweits and Dalhousie also claimed his attention, stressing the point that with the material available at the present time, with proper coaching and training, will make Dal step next year to win.

Mr. Frank Hennessey, Treasurer of the Club was the next speaker, who gave a clear and intelligent outline of the finances of the past year; also the different expenses in connection with the maintenance of an athletic organization. In concluding the speaker voiced his sentiments strongly on the damage done to the A. A. A. grounds

from year to year by parties who don't seem to realize the expense incurred by such depredations.

Messrs James Coyle and S. F. Doyle, chairman of the football and entertainment committees respectively made brief and emphatic reports of their different offices; the latter speaker in continuing his remarks stated that he thought that Charlottetown has always lived up to its reputation as a city of entertainers and receptionists. He also informed the meeting that he had recently received a wire from President Covey of the M. P. R. A. A. U. C. congratulating the Abegweits as a club and organization which is doing so much for athletics in the Maritimes.

Dr. W. J. P. McMillan who was next called upon, spoke briefly congratulating the athletes in their different lines of endeavor and last but not least, the executive for the splendid work accomplished during the past year, mentioning the fact that no organization could live and prosper without a real live executive board. He concluded by guaranteeing his support to the Abegweit Club at all times.

The securing of a coach for the hockey team for 1924, after much discussion, was left to the executive.

HALF HUNDRED ATHLETES TO REPRESENT ENG

PARIS, Nov. 15.—Great Britain's team in the Olympic winter sports events at Chamonix will comprise fifty athletes, including a hockey team, the participation of which had been doubtful until the French Olympic Committee received official advice from London today. The rubbers, trainers and delegates will bring the British delegation to sixty members.

Umatior Pontes, President of the Portuguese Olympic Committee, has sent official acceptance of the French invitation to participate in next year's games. Portugal will send thirty athletes, coming in the association football and sculling events and in the running over the longer distances.

MCKINNEY WINS FROM YANK IN 8 HEAT

TORONTO, Nov. 14.—Fourteen heats, in addition to short exhibitions by Chilcoat (2:04 1/2) and Kate Hal (2:04 1/2) (half-mile record), the two fastest harness horses owned in Canada, featured the Toronto Driving Club meet yesterday afternoon at Dufferin Park. There were several other features also. For instance, the crowd was one of the largest that ever attended a trotting meet in Toronto. Billy Bishop's time of 2:16 the last heat of the day was a marvelous performance, considering the rough going, while the trot, postponed from Saturday, turned out to be an eight-heat affair, with McKinney grabbing all three heats yesterday to win the race and first money. The latter was much the best of his field, as Van Todd ruined his chances by repeatedly breaking, while the others didn't have "lick" enough to get the smooth-going McKinney.

Pearl D. the Strathroy-owned horse, won the only heat yesterday in the 2:30 pace, and thereby took down first money, as she had two to her credit on Saturday. However, in the postponed 2:17 pace three heats were required before Liberty Patch, the Cobourg-owned horse, got the decision, Jim Todd, Jr. won the fifth, or first heat yesterday, and looked like repeating in the next, as he was lapped on Liberty Patch coming around the last bend, but he went to a break and finished fifth, Liberty Patch winning the heat. In the next heat Liberty Patch went to the front, with Jim Todd, Jr. and Joe Grattan trailing. At the half Joe Grattan moved up alongside Liberty Patch, and Jim Todd, Jr. was in a pocket that he never got out of until the race was over, Liberty Patch winning the heat and race.

IN MEMORIAM AND ZEV NEXT

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 15.—Prospects for a match race between In Memoriam, winner of the \$50,000 Latonia championship, and the Rancocas stable's Zev, to be run at Churchill Downs, Friday or Saturday, became promising, following an exchange of telegrams between S. C. Hildreth and Col. M. J. Winn.

In a telegram to Col. Winn, general manager of the Kentucky Jockey Club, Mr. Hildreth, trainer for the Rancocas stable, expressed a willingness to race the conqueror of Papyrus, and winner of the Kentucky Derby, against In Memoriam over a route of one mile or more, for a side bet of \$25,000, or "as high as Mr. Wiedmann owner of In Memoriam wishes."

Carl Wiedmann, Newport sportsman and owner of In Memoriam, is quoted as having said that if conditions could be agreed upon he would be glad to send his horse against the Rancocas stable's crack.
