D. McQuarrie, formerly chief engineer on the Black Diamond steamship Cape Breton, has resigned his position with that company and taken a similar one on the Government Dredge Cape Breton.

The schooner Rob S., which left Louisburg Sunday for P. E. I., for a cargo of potatoes, sank Tuesday off Port Hastings. The crew were saved. The Rob S. was about twenty tons register, and was owned by W. W. Lewis, who recently purchased her from Captain John Grant, of Gabarus.—Louisburg Ex.

A splendid trip was made by the schooner Mildred M. Bell, Capt. Chas. Bell, of Dublin Shore, Lunenburg, N. S., which on Saturday, the 23rd November at 10 p. m., left Annandale, in this Province, loaded with produce by Edwin McParlane, of that place. Twenty-four hours after leaving Annandale the schooner had safely arrived at Halifax.

On Wednesday evening, at the home of the bride's brother, James Jenkins, Miss Margaret Jenkins was united in marriage to Albert Nicholson, Orwell Cove, Rev. S. D. MacPhee, officiating clergyman. The bride was prettily dressed in cream veiling and lace, and was unattended. The happy couple who are very popular, have the good wishes of very many for a long life and much bliss. Mrs. Nicholson is a niece of D. P. Irving, M. L. A., Vernon River Bridge.

The Fanny Young sailed Thursday with 110 tons of coal for Montague, P. E. Island. Yesterday the Diamond loaded 145 tons for Canso and the Mary Joseph 30 tons for Souris, P. E. I. Today the Serec is loading 135 tons for Georgetown. The Lelia Linwood will take 30 tons as ballast for Montague, P. E. I., and the Kingfisher will take 45 tons for the same place, the Fanny Young will load another cargo of Island produce and return here about Dec. 20.—Glace Bay Gazette.

Asked with regard to trade in the Maritime Provinces field, Mr. Smith of Smith Bros., Halifax, said: "Our travellers are doing very well, quite as well I think as they did last year. They are selling for both immediate and next spring, and in neither section is there anything to complain of. Collections, I regret to say, are not as good as we should like to see them; still there is a fair amount of money coming in from day to day, and when I read of the money scarcity in the United States I cannot help feeling thankful that so far we have little to complain of."

The last issue of the Maritime Merchant says: "There is little of any provincial dairy offering. We saw a little from Cape Breton, but it was pretty poor stuff. There is some provincial creamery, but it is less of a factor than it was a few years ago. Our supplies to-day come principally from Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick, Montreal and the West. The general situation may be said to be a little stronger than it was a week ago; prices went off a bit at the acute stage of the money panic in New York, but they have since revived and the trade say they expect little, if any further change for the balance of the year. We see by western papers that Ontario creameries are getting 30c. for prints and that dairy is selling at 24 1/2c."

It is almost impossible to purchase Ontario bran from the mills, says the Maritime Merchant, as the local demand in that province is absorbing the entire product of the different mills. A good many contracts made early have not yet been completed, and when they are, there will be sufficient supply locally for the usual business of the last month of the year. Prices of middlings, bran, &c, which showed a little weakness some days ago, have stiffened up again and quite firm at present quotations. There is a small decline in the price of oats locally, due to the fact that Prince Edward Island vessels are anxious to sell out their cargoes before winter closes down. Prince Edward Island oats in Halifax were about three cents a bushel below the parity of Ontario values.
