BROWNS WIN FROM SENATORS

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, July 15—Lyn Lary, the shortstop Washington traded to St. Louis a few weeks ago, came through with a double in the 11th inning today that drove in the deciding run in a 3-2 victory of the Browns over the Senators at Washington.

ENGLISH TEAM LOOK LIKE WINNERS

South Africans Trail By 222 Runs In Third Test Cricket Match.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LEEDS, England, July 15—Ahead 222 runs, England tonight in a fortified position to defeat South Africa in the third test cricket match finishing tomorrow.

Although Mitchell and Smith scored freely and quickly, the South African field did not give any chances. Near the end of the day, however, Wyatt was missed at overtop.

After rolling up 72 runs Mitchell slashed one of Cyril Vincent's half volleys to the boundary where Kenneth Viljoen caught it. Smith was bowled by Vincent five minutes later, having knocked out 57 runs.

Superb batting by Eric Rowan proved the saving feature of South Africa's dismal innings. Opening today's play with I. J. Siedle, the scoreboard reading 26 runs for one from Saturday, the young Transvaal star batted for three and a half hours.

Siedle was run out when he hesitated over a second run, Arthur Mitchell's fast return him to the crease by yards. He made a careful 33. Viljoen batted quickly and hit up 19 runs before Smith caught him in the slips.

After lunch the English team tightened up and wickets fell like nine pins. Four wickets fell with only one run added while three were lost without the addition of a run.

FRANKIE IS NOTED FOR HIS ABILITY TO COME FROM BEHIND AND WIN.

Schumacher Finally Beaten By Cincinnati; Cards And Cubs Keep On Winning

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, July 15—Hal Schumacher's four-year old jinx over Cincinnati and his 11-game winning streak were broken today at Cincinnati as the Reds blasted New York Giant's ace right-hander from the box in the seventh and then went on to defeat the league leaders 13-6 for their sixth straight victory.

The triumph ended Schumacher's reign over the Reds after he had beaten them 14 times and tied them once since May 19, 1932. It also reduced the Giants lead to five games over St. Louis Cardinals, who turned back Boston Braves for their eleventh successive victory.

Three times the Reds came from behind to tie the score in a hard-hitting affair, which saw Chuck Dressen's men collect a total of 18 hits, including by Bill Myers off Schumacher, Carl Hubbell and Leon Chagnon. The Giants got to three Cincinnati hurlers, Leroy Hermann, Dan Brennan, and Benny Frey, for 14 safe blows with Mel Ott cracking out his 20th homer of the season and Hank Leiber adding his 14th.

Cubs Beat Phillies In 10th Chicago Cubs on home grounds chalked up their eighth straight victory but they were carried to 10 innings by the Phillies before Bill Herman's line double with two out sent Augie Galan home with the run that gave them a 2-1 decision.

The third place Cubs put over a run in the first inning and apparently had the game won as Larry French and the former infielder, Bucky Walters, engaged in a scoreless hurling duel for the next seven frames.

The Phillies rallied in the ninth, however staving off defeat temporarily by tying the score. Herman's double in the 10th scoring Galan, who had walked, won the game for the Cubs.

15th For "Dizzy" Frankie Frisch's climbing St. Louis Cardinals won their 11th consecutive victory by defeating Boston Braves 13-6 at St. Louis. The Braves collected 14 safeties off the erratic hurling of Dizzy Dean, but the effective hitting of his teammates enabled the Cardinal hurler to turn in his 15th triumph of the season—half way to his 1934 total.

Frankhouse, usually effective against the Redbirds, was pounded for 11 hits and 10 runs and knocked out of the box with two out in the third inning.

BASEBALL'S BIG SIX

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) Joe Medwick and Bill Terry, the only members of baseball's big six to see action yesterday, took advantage of the opportunity to close in on the leaders. The slugging St. Louis Cardinals outfielder drove 374 three hits in four trips to the plate for a gain of five points while the New York Giants' manager connected safely three times in five times at bat for an increase of four points.

SCHMELING-BAER FIGHT NOW LIKELY

Madison Square Garden Announcement However, Conflicts With That of 20th Century Club.

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, July 15—James J. Johnston, boxing director of Madison Square Garden, announced today he had made an agreement with former heavyweight champion Max Baer to meet another former titleholder, Max Schmeling, in a 15-round bout in September in the Garden's Long Island City Bowl.

"Ancl Hoffman, Baer's manager, has asked to meet Schmeling under the Garden's auspices provided we can assure him we have Schmeling under contract," Johnston said. "I talked with Joe Jacobs, Schmeling's manager, in Berlin, over the trans-Atlantic telephone yesterday and he told me Schmeling consented to meet Baer."

If Johnston's plans materialize, the winner of the Schmeling-Baer contest will meet champion James J. Braddock in a 15-round title bout next June.

HOLY REDEEMER AND GROCERS MEET TONIGHT

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEWARK, N. J., July 15—Jack Doyle, handsome Irish-heavyweight, scored a four-round knockout tonight over Jack Redmond, Indianapolis negro, in his second United States ring appearance.

Early in the fourth Redmond went down for a short count, wobbled to his feet and hung on the ropes under a rain of blows. He fell through the ropes when the end came and was counted out as he lay in the laps of ring-side spectators.

Wrestling Match Ends In Riot

By Guardian's Special Wire) CHICAGO, July 15—The wrestling match between Dan O'Mahoney, heavyweight champion from Ireland, and George Zaharopoulos of Pueblo, Colo., broke up in a riotous disorder at Mills Stadium tonight with O'Mahoney winner of the fall and the better man in some impromptu fighting.

Awarded the fall in 18:05 with a body slam, O'Mahoney walked toward Zaharopoulos to shake hands, but the Pueblo wrestler suddenly smashed the Irishman on the jaw. O'Mahoney countered by knocking Zaharopoulos down and a scuffle, half-wrestling and half fighting ensued as the police, officials and members of the Illinois State Athletic Commission climbed into the ring to stop the two brawlers.

Order was obtained after several minutes. O'Mahoney weighed 213 1-2 and Zaharopoulos scaled 241.

U. S. Team Not Taking Any Chances

LONDON, July 15—Without showing a trace of over-confidence although most British experts and betting commissioners called them to defeat Germany in the Davis Cup inter-zone final this week-end, the members of the United States international tennis squad put in two hours of hard practice today under a scorching sun at Wimbledon.

Non-playing Captain Joseph Wear of Philadelphia is making a point of not letting the singles players—Wilmer Allison of Austin, Tex., Don Budge, of Oakland, Cal., and Sidney B. Wood, Jr., of New York—play against each other in order to avert anything resembling a "test match."

Red Wings Tie Up Playoff Series By Defeating The Pioneers 5-4 Last Evening

I., July 15—Behind the steady hurrying of big Jim Wilson the Redwings came from behind to defeat the Pioneers 5-4 in a close and exciting playoff game here last night. Wilson after a rather shaky start in the first inning when he allowed the Pioneers 2 runs, settled down to pitch lovely ball allowing but six hits and striking out 7. The Red Wings were outlilt six to three but took advantage of their hitting and costly Pioneer errors. They won the game with a run in the last inning with 2 out when Schurman dropped a low throw by Ward at first which would have retired the side and left the game a 4-4 draw.
