**Big Oil Concern Expands In West**

WINNIPEG, Aug. 24.—One more sign of prosperity in the West is the decision of the Imperial Oil Company to build a new refinery at Calgary, to cost \$2,500,000. The site is about 107 acres, and the plant will have a daily capacity of 3,000 barrels of crude oil, which will likely be obtained from Wyoming or Montana, the present source of supply for the company's Regina Council is favorable, the ratification to the company. **FOCUS OF LIMELIGHT AGAIN ON YAT SEN**

SHANGHAI, Aug. 21.—Sun Yat Sen, deposed President of China who recently fled here from Canton, leaped to the front today as a pivotal figure in the reorganization of the Chinese Government with the receipt of a telegram from Wu Pei-Fu, dominant military figure of North China flatly endorsing Sun's recent manifesto and pledging his support to Sun's policy for rebuilding the federal government machinery.

The Southern Leader who, Peking authorities recently declared had been wiped from the slate of Chinese politics by his overthrow at Canton at the hands of Chan Chung-Ming, has become the focal point of a series of international conferences here, which his supporters say points to an early settlement of the country's problems.

Despite the fact that Sun Yat Sen backed Chang Tso-Lin, Governor of the three eastern provinces in his late unsuccessful tilt against Wu Pei-Fu, the latter's telegram today addressed to his personal representative here, General Sun Yuch, expresses unqualified endorsement of Sun Yat Sen's policies.

These include the Southerner's terms for the convocation and functioning of parliament free from all outside interests, self government for the province to replace the Tschin, or military governance of the independent provincial armies into labor battalions to wield the hoe instead of the sword.

In the meantime the supply of soft coal on hand will not permit an all night service.

Summerside has suffered from fires and from burglaries in the past, and it is not believed that the present need is so great that the entire light supply of the town should be shut off.

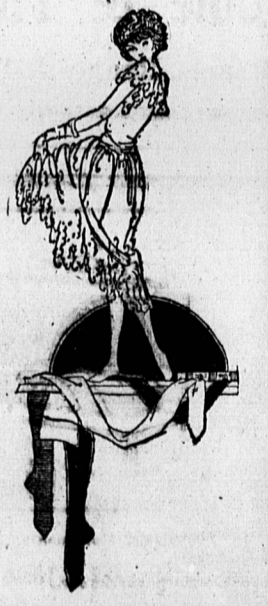
