AMERICAN PATROL FIRES ON ITALIAN

(Canadian Press Despatch.)
WASHINGTON, October 9.—Vice-Admiral Sims called the Navy Department to-day that an American patrol vessel on duty at night in the war zone had fired on an Italian submarine which failed to answer recognition signals, killing one officer and one enlisted man.

REPLY TO CITIZEN

Sir:—In your issue of The Evening Guardian, Oct. 3, appears a letter signed "Citizen." I think someone must have walked on his pet corn in some of those special trains coming or going to the exhibition.

First and foremost, sir, anyone who makes such a sweeping accusation against our railway trainmen should come out in the open. In other words,—sign his name. He must be a little frightened of the very thing he claims is in a measure responsible for the evil of the present railway travelling,—"public opinion."

It is altogether wrong to blame our railway trainmen for a crush or for delay in handling a crowded train such as we had on exhibition nights returning. In the first place, this is something that does not occur but once or twice in the year, that is, such a crowd in any one train. Secondly, to make a comparison with the mainland side, re handling an excursion train is rank folly, and shows the person is not fully aware of what he is writing about. On the mainland side in any one of the railways they have every facility for handling crowds of passengers, as it is almost a daily occurrence. These trains are mostly passing through towns where an extra passenger car is almost always available, if too crowded, and where at the principal stations the services of a policeman can be procured,—or several if necessary,—to look after the unruly.

Notwithstanding this fact, if "Citizen" had ever seen one of the Har-vest Excursion trains on the mainland side composed of principally the same element who attend those exhibitions, tea parties, and horse races, I don't think he would care to make any more comparisons. I want to say before going any further, I hold no brief from the railway men to take their part, but it is like hitting a man with his hands tied. None of those men are in a position to defend themselves, though a great many of them are much more competent to do so than the writer. I have always received the very best of treatment from our trainmen, and being in the most crowded train, which I believe was on Thursday of Exhibition week, a train of sixteen cars loaded, with four men to handle it, I understand there were over 1200 tickets taken, I think those men did remarkably well. If "Citizen" is not one of those men who take one seat,—with his wife, sister or daughter in an opposite one, and try to occupy the four seats,—and if he will, as I said before, come from under cover, I have no doubt he will find some trainman who will attend to the matter of answering his letter.

There is always the right of report or appeal to the higher authorities if those men are remiss in their duty, and if "Citizen" or any other one is in the right "public opinion" will be solid behind them.

SUCCESSFUL BRITISH RAIDS

(Canadian Press Despatch)
LONDON, Oct. 8.—The Germans made an attack last evening on British positions east of Ypres where the British recently have made important advances. The war office reports that the enemy was repulsed. The statement follows: An infantry attack developed against our positions east of Polygon Wood after the enemy had put down a heavy barrage yesterday, at dusk on our front between Hollebeke and Broodseinde. The attack was beaten off by our fire. A few prisoners remained in our hands. We successfully raided the enemy lines east of Monchy last night.

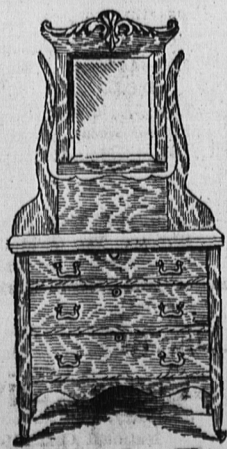

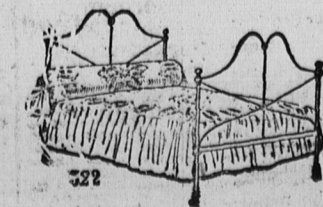
