PROPERTY.

The Company owns in the Matachewan Gold Area approximately 840 acres in a compact block. This property is the result of the consolidation of the holdings of the Matachewan Canadian Gold Limited, The Matachewan Rand Gold Mines Limited and the Clemens-Robb claims, located in the centre of what is termed the Matachewan Gold Camp. The merger of these properties places the Company as one of the largest owners of mining properties in Northern Ontario.

HISTORY AND LOCATION OF MATACHEWAN CAMP.

RAILWAY TOWER IN DUBLIN BLOWN UP; SEVERAL INJURED

DUBLIN, May 1. - The signal tower of the Great Northern Railway in Dublin was blown up today as a train was leaving for Drogheda. The coaches of the train were struck by an avalanche of fragments of cement and seventeen passengers were injured by flying debris and broken glass. When the explosion took place fire was opened on the station guards. Today two men in a taxiab drove into a suburb and held up a constable and threw a bomb into a dry goods store, wrecking it. Several employes living in the rear of the store were injured. The entire district in which the store is situated was shaken by the detonation.
