RUSSIA MEDDLING.

Russia has taken another step to thwart the policy of Britain. It will be remembered that in the convention between Britain and Egypt with regard to the Soudan, it was agreed that no foreign consuls should be recognized within the reconquered territory. Russia has made haste to appoint a number of consuls to the Soudan. This sudden action, ignoring the terms agreed upon between the British government and the Khedive is the more significant because, down to a recent date Russia has in no way concerned herself with the affairs of Africa, leaving the other European powers to settle its affairs and partition its territories at will.

There is little doubt that Russia's object is to assist her ally, France, in having the affairs of Egypt and the Soudan, with the question of British occupation brought before a conference of the powers. France is sore over the British occupation of Egypt, Britain's control of the Suez canal, and is especially embittered over the Fashoda incident. Turkey, too is jealous of Britain's control in a land yet nominally subject to the Sultan. Russia and Turkey are now on friendly terms and the Grand Turk is flushed with his recent victory over Greece. It would be very awkward indeed if the Sultan should recognize, and grant his exequatur to the Russian consuls in the Soudan. A combination of Russia, France and Turkey might force the Khedive to abrogate his agreement with Britain.

Russia has apparently chosen her ground with the Machiavellian cunning for which Russian diplomats are noted. It will not be surprising if the question now raised should speedily become more acute and alarming than the Fashoda question or any of the recent crises in the far east.

The letter of "Purchaser" in yesterday's issue, through written over a pen name, is the letter of one who knows whereof he affirms. And among other things he said was this: "We have all the capital required lying idle in the banks that could easily, by judicious investment in manufactures, be made to return its owners 15 to 20 per cent on their investment." A much lower rate—a return of 8 to 10 per cent would be a great gain if it could be saved for the hundreds of thousands of capital now earning but 3 to 3 1/2 per cent. But the indirect gain from the establishment of factories would be quite as important. They would put money in circulation, furnish a home market for raw material, give employment to labor, enable us to keep our sons and daughters at home, bring money into the country and prevent money going out, thus making money more plentiful, times better and everybody more prosperous. The success of industries already establish-

ed should be a spur to new enterprises along similar lines. The subject is a large and a fruitful one. Island people have been too unmindful of our manufacturing possibilities.

AN ELECTRIC BOAT.

An invention is now being perfected by a Toronto marine engineer, which, if it is capable of all which the inventor claims for it, ought to revolutionize navigation. The man who gets credit for the plan is Mr. W. A. McGregor. In a conversation with a newspaper reporter, Mr. McGregor spoke of his design. The phenomenon which he has invented is called an electric and steam boat. It consists of ten watertight compartments which are all stationary, and has eight air-tight water wheels with automatic propeller blades, electricity enter into its make-up as the power which drives the propeller. The current is generated by an ordinary dynamo on board the ship, which is placed in a position to give its force more directly on the shaft than is the case in ordinary vessels. "By means of the appliances here and the special kind of propeller," the inventor said, "the boat will be able to go twice as fast as any boat afloat. There is an automatic gauge which will never allow the vessel to run aground. There is a sort of feather which will act when the boat gets into shallow or dangerous water by which means the propeller may be instantly reversed and the boat sent backward without even the knowledge of the engineer or the man at the helm.

"The boat has also a steel deck amid-ships which will prevent the destruction of the entire boat by a fire, should one break out. In fact, the lower half of the vessel is absolutely fire-proof. The whole vessel is iron, with the exception of the wood finishings on the upper decks. The boat is to all appearance, when in the water, like any other one, but a careful inspection reveals the fact that it is very different in its construction." Mr. McGregor hopes to make a trial of his boat during the summer.

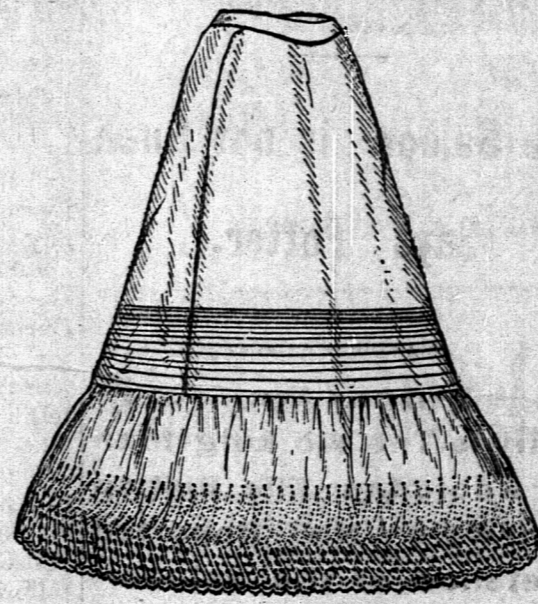
