

TAPPING WIRELESS MESSAGES IS EASY

RANCHING IN WEST

Mr. A. C. Fawcett Well Known in P. E. I.

TALKS ABOUT COUNTRY

More Harvesters Going Out Than Will Find Employment.

A. C. Fawcett of Upper Sackville who with his brother Sam, are the proprietors of a cattle ranch near Greymouth, N. W. T. arrived home the last of the week. Mr. Fawcett went west about four months ago with nearly five hundred head of cattle, the greater number of which he obtained in the lower provinces. He bought a number in Ontario, and strange to say they did not stand the journey as well, nor have they done as well out there as those from New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

"We have between six and seven hundred head there now," Mr. Fawcett answered in reply to a question, "and they are all doing splendidly. You would hardly know the animals we took out four months ago. The grass is rich and luxuriant and cattle thrive on it."

Greymouth is some 40 or 50 miles south of Medicine Hat and near the centre of a rich grazing country. It is hilly, but this does not interfere with the cattle which after being landed are turned loose and allowed pretty much their own liberty. Cattle going into that country from the east have to be watched until they become accustomed to their changed conditions, which they soon do, and then they give their owners very little trouble. Sometimes they may be fifty miles away and mixed up with the cattle from other ranches. Occasionally an animal is killed by wolves, but this does not happen very often. In the fall they are rounded up and each rancher picks out his own cattle and takes charge of them.

While cattle get their own living the greater part of the year, all the leading ranchers make some provision for them during the cold weather. They have sheds for them to run in, to protect them from the fierce storms, and for a short time they may require a little hay. But the actual winter is short and the caring for several hundred cattle at this time is not as big a job as an eastern man might imagine. Horses frequently remain out all winter.

Mr. Fawcett says the reports of the wheat yield in Manitoba and the west have not been exaggerated. The crop will undoubtedly be an immense one, and the yield in some cases will run forty bushels to the acre. Mr. Fawcett spoke of knowing one man who had 800 acres of nothing but wheat. This would probably yield him in the vicinity of 30,000 bushels which at fifty cents would amount to a snug sum in this country. The man is a native of Ontario. He went west some years ago a poor man; and is now well off. Of course this is an exceptional case, but many people have three and four hundred acres in wheat, and this year with everything in their favor in Manitoba and Northwest farmer will do exceedingly well.

Coming home Mr. Fawcett met eleven trains of harvesters between Winnipeg and Montreal, all from Ontario. He is of the opinion that more harvesters are going out than will find employment readily.—Sackville Post.

THE STOWAWAY DID IT.

Had the Islander's Water Tight Compartments Not Been Opened all Might Have Been Saved.

SEATTLE, Washington, August 20.—J. T. Snyder, a resident of Juneau, arrived on the steamer Farallon to-day from Juneau. He left the steamer Islander just half a minute after the captain had jumped overboard, and they both held on to the same raft for fully half an hour. The captain said he could not understand why the boat went down so quickly. The captain finally said: "Boys, I cannot stand it any longer, and casting his life preservers away, at once sank."

At the inquest held at Juneau Mr. Snyder said: "The pilot testified that he was on the bridge, and that as soon as he struck he told the captain that he was going to beach her, but the Captain said no, there is a better place about three miles from here and she will easily float that long."

The testimony showed that there was a stowaway, in the forward water tight compartment. When the vessel struck the water rushed in on him and he set up a big howl and being immediately under the sailors' quarters one of them thoughtlessly rushed down, and opened the compartment, which allowed the sea to come rolling into the hold, carrying the body of the stowaway and the sailor with it. This was done without the captain's knowledge, and I think excused him for thinking the vessel would float several hours, which it would have done had the water tight compartment not been opened. It was established that if the pilot had carried out his intention he could have gotten her on the beach without the loss of any lives except that of the stowaway.
