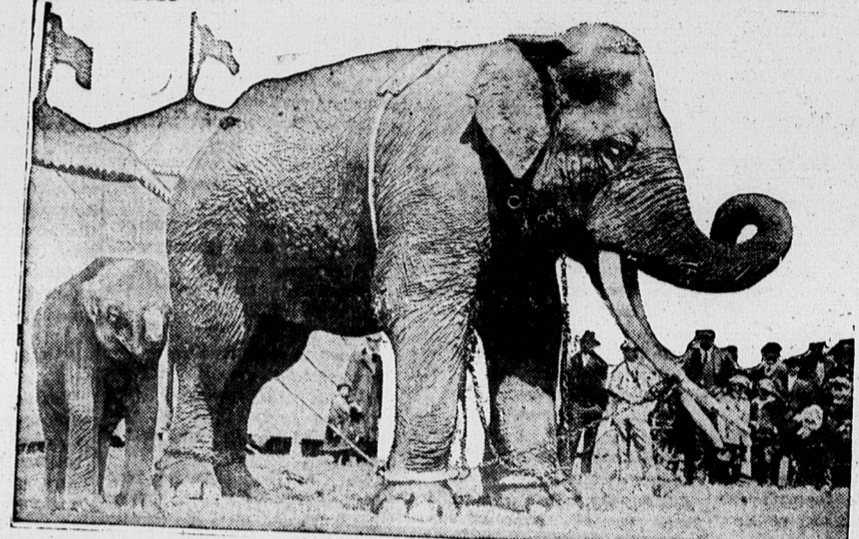
Mrs. Arthur Brennan entertained very delightfully for afternoon tea at her home in Summerside this week.
