ARRESTED FOR CONSPIRACY.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 16.—The hearing of Harry W. Jones, secretary-treasurer of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers, before United States Commissioner Young was postponed today until November 5th. His confinement of \$10,000 was continued. The charge against Jones is conspiracy to transport explosives illegally. Jones was taken in custody here following the arrest and confession of George Davies, alias George O'Donnell, an iron worker, in New York. Davies was brought to this city and it is expected will repeat his confession before the United States Grand Jury, which convenes here November 11.

MEETING POSTPONED.—Owing to the inclemency of the weather on Oct. 14th, the special meeting, for that date of the Hope River Farmers Institute is postponed till Tuesday, Oct. 21st, 7.30 p. m. Mr. M. H. Coughlan will address the meeting on Entomology. 2164.

ILLEGAL SHOOTING.—A gentleman called at the Guardian Office yesterday and reported that parties were heard shooting brant or geese at Squaw Point on Sunday last which is strictly against the law and will no doubt be investigated by the proper authorities.

SHOOTING MATCHES.—The spoon shoot of the Fourth Regiment and that of the Civilian Rifle Club tomorrow, with extra prizes for those making 100 points, ought to bring out a large number of competitors. These events will be at 200, 300 and 600 yards, commencing promptly at 2 p. m. Owing to the afternoons becoming dark earlier than usual, it is urged that every one be ready to start shooting at two sharp. The 200 yard range closes at 3 o'clock. The "Whirlwind Shoot" on Thanksgiving afternoon at Kensington Range, beginning at 1 p. m. sharp, will be a team match of provincial interest. Every part of the province has been invited through the press and private letters, to compete. "The Island" is justly noted for her excellent marksmen. It is a cause of pride that this year the Fourth Regiment team won the Maritime championship, and that next year will see the Bisley team with brother Landrigan in its ranks. For some time past riflemen have expressed a wish to have a team match arranged of five men to compete for the supremacy of the province. This much desired event has been made possible by the magnificent gifts of our enthusiastic sport Capt. B. A. McKinnon, who has donated a large Silver Trophy for a yearly shoot, on Thanksgiving day. This offer has been nobly seconded by Colonel Edson, who awards five badges, to the members of the team winning team. A third gift has come in from another citizen, in the shape of five silver spoons to be awarded to the members of the team winning second place, in the match, at 200, 500 and 600 yards, 7 shots each with one sighting shot, teams, or men individually using any ammunition. It is expected about six teams will enter for this event—the more the merrier. Individual shots have a chance of winning Lieut. E. Ritchie's Silver Medal for any one making the highest score on the field. Young shots, or all those who have not won a prize this year, have a good show in winning a silver medal given by Mr. W. S. Louson and there are good prospects that four or five more prizes will be given in this consolation match. Any one therefore, who would like to bring out a prize for this event, kindly hand to Range Officer, Mr. R. V. Longworth. There are rumors that a Turkey and a bottle of Paine's Celery Compound, for the nerves, will be thrown in for consolation. It is requested that the Range Officer have the twelve targets in commission Monday and that every man will be ready promptly at 1 p. m. to do his part in helping to make the remembrance of this "Whirlwind Shoot" one of general Thanksgiving throughout the balance of the year.

AN INTERESTING CASE.—In the Court of Chancery yesterday, His Lordship Justice Fitzgerald, the Vice-Chancellor presiding, the case of Forbes v. Dewar et al was argued. In this matter a bill was filed for the administration of the estate of Mrs. Bailey. After the suit was commenced an application was made by Stanley W. Bailey to be admitted as a defendant, and he claimed the personal property of the intestate by virtue of his being her adopted son of a decree of the Probate Court of the State of Massachusetts, U. S. A. The facts of the case are interesting. Shortly stated they are as follows:—The intestate, Mrs. Bailey, was born in this Island, and married an American with whom she went afterwards to live in Boston. In the course of their life there, they adopted, when he was a boy, the defendant, Stanley Bailey. Subsequently Mrs. Bailey's husband died. She had an interest in the old homestead farm where she was born and so after her husband's death she returned to the Island and lived here. With her she brought from Boston the household furniture she possessed there. She died here an intestate, and subsequently a bill of administration of the estate was filed. To that the deceased's adopted son became a defendant in order to claim the personal property and furniture which his mother had brought from Boston. That is the question which was argued yesterday. For the defendant Bailey, Mr. J. Johnston, K.C., appeared, and for the complainants Mr. J. D. Stewart, of Georgetown. After hearing the contentions of counsel, His Lordship reserved his judgment.

TO SECURE SETTLERS

OTTAWA October 13.—The immigration branch of the Department of the Interior has decided to discontinue for a year at least, the practice of sending farm delegates to Great Britain to assist in securing settlers for Canada. It has been found that the increasing number of British settlers in Canada returning to visit their old homes has removed the necessity of the Government supplementing their efforts to secure new settlers by sending over paid farm delegates. The voluntary immigration work done by old countrymen who have made a success of their work here when they revisit the old country is the most effective immigration work.

FIRST BALLOON DESCENDS

CHARTRES, France, October 13.—Early this morning the German balloon Hamburg descended close to the ground near Chateaudun and the pilot had begun to ask his whereabouts when the inhabitants recognizing the nationality of the occupants, seized a rope hanging from the basket and refused to allow the balloon to depart until the arrival of the police. The aeronauts were then able to prove that they were merely competitors in the balloon race for the James Gordon Bennett Cup.

RENNES, France, October 13.—Five of the balloons in the race for the James Gordon Bennett Cup passed over here this evening. Seven passed over Rennes to the southeast, and three over Fougères, to the northeast.

GRANVILLE, France, October 13.—Ralph Upson's balloon representing the United States in the international race, passed over here at six o'clock tonight. Granville is a seaport at the foot of a promontory projecting into the English Channel.

RECORD RUN.

TORONTO, Oct. 16.—With the roof of one of the new compartment cars ablaze, the C. P. R. New York express train made a record run from Hamilton to Port Credit yesterday, for water to extinguish the fire. No one was injured.

WHEN AT THE TELEPHONE

Few people seem to realize the endless amount of time they waste in answering the telephone, and are equally regardless of the annoyance they cause people in business by not giving a plain, direct and immediate answer. This fault, of course, is due to thoughtlessness, and, therefore, is quite pardonable, but is none the less provoking. So a few simple rules, if followed out, may prove a help, both to the caller and the person called. First.—Never pick up the receiver until the bell stops ringing. In so doing the bell on the other party's wire rings and he will answer it, which causes a babble of voices and much confusion. Second.—Do not place your mouth too close to the mouthpiece. This causes a vibration and thus prevents your being heard distinctly. Third.—When you call a party give "Central" the district number and letter, slowly and distinctly. Fourth.—When you get the party your question should be, "Is this So-and-So?" not, "Who is this?" which is neither a pertinent nor a time saving question. Fifth.—Speak in as moderate a tone as you would if the person were right beside you. To shout also makes a vibration, which is very annoying, and even a deaf person can hear a moderate tone over the phone. Sixth.—Don't mention names or tell "all you know" over the phone. This is a very unwise policy and you have no right to monopolize it indefinitely to the exclusion of those on your wire.
