**THE HALIFAX.**—The S. S. Halifax arrived in port at 3.30 on Friday on her last trip of the season to Charlottetown. She brought about 400 tons of cargo. She sailed at 10.30 Saturday morning taking out about 250 tons of freight.

**PLEASANT NEWS.**—Mr. Frank Bell of West Royalty who had his ankle badly injured recently as the result of a runaway accident and who is now under surgical treatment in a Montreal Hospital is reported as doing splendidly. No amputation will be necessary.

**ISLAND PRODUCE EXPORTED.**—Two cargoes of Island produce left Charlottetown for Halifax and North Sydney on Saturday. The schooner Electric, carried a cargo of potatoes, turnips, carrots, codfish and oysters, and the schooner Milo with a cargo of potatoes, turnips, carrots, hay, beets and cabbage.

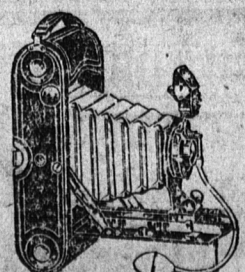
**1915 LUMBER SEASON.**—In a brief interview with Messrs. M. Pooto & Co., the largest lumber dealers on the Island, at the close of another season, a representative of the Guardian obtained a few impressions of the season's trade which may be interesting to many. Comparing the present season with that of 1914 it was reported that importations have fallen off considerably, in fact to the extent of 25 per cent., the number of schooners which arrived this year being about 20 per cent. less than last year. Owing to the decreased demand the stocks of lumber carried over the winter are very much larger than usual. The diminished consumption is due in great measure to the temporary lull in the development of the fox business. Only a few small ranches have been put up, and a small quantity of lumber has been used in the extension and repair of existing ranches. In regard to public buildings no large undertakings were on hand as in the two previous years, when the Cathedral, the Palace and the Orphanage were all under construction. To counterbalance this, however, the building of dwelling houses has been about double that of last year. About 100 carloads of island lumber has been used in building construction in the city. The demand for spruce deals for the English market continues brisk, and would undoubtedly be very much larger were the difficulty of obtaining tonnage to carry cargoes to European ports not so pronounced. The opening of the new Car Ferry will probably see a considerable development in building all over the Island.

**CREDITABLE RECORD.**—Mr. P. W. Turner, of O'Leary, spent the weekend in Charlottetown, paying a visit to his brother, B. H. (Jack) who is a member of No. 2 Siege Battery, "Jack" Turner, son of Mr. H. W. Turner, Merchant, O'Leary, is one of nine young men from this section who are now in khaki. Of the O'Leary Baseball Team of nine, six have enlisted and the other three had good and sufficient reasons for remaining at home. Those on this team who have enlisted are Harry Boulter, Walter Lidstone and Gordon Selliker of C. Company, 55th Battalion now in England, John Burns and Ira Ellis in the Abegweit Highland Regiment now in Charlottetown, and B. H. Turner, above mentioned, in No. 2 Siege Battery. In addition to these Ray Kirk and Charles Buxton, of the O'Leary Hockey Club, are at the front. Harry Balderson enlisted in the Medical Corps and after some time at Valcartier was invalided home and is at hospital. Other members of the Hockey Club volunteered but were rejected on account of slight physical defects. O'Leary has good cause to feel proud of the record made by its young men, a record all the more creditable that without any special recruiting solicitation, there being only one recruiting meeting held there during the early weeks of the war.

**RED CROSS TEA AT CORNWALL.**—The Red Cross tea under the auspices of the Cornwall-York Women's Institute, which was advertised for Monday evening, Nov. 15th and postponed because of weather conditions, came off on Tuesday evening the 16th. The sum of \$45 was realised, with which the ladies plan on buying material to be made up into garments for the soldiers. The tables were tastefully decorated with ferns and fruit, which goes to prove that Cornwall-York is fortunate in having artistic talent of no small merit among its members. The Institute members presented an attractive appearance in their white dresses and refreshment there was some disappointment over the programme which had been prepared for Monday night, those taking part having had a previous engagement for Tuesday evening. However, Mr. John Campbell kindly consented to give some seats on his own account, and Mrs. Gordon McMillan and judging from some of the complimentary remarks from a number of those present everyone was satisfied that they had had a good time. The members of the Institute wish to thank all those who contributed in any way in making the tea a success. They propose holding another later on, for the benefit of the soldier boys who have enlisted from Cornwall.

Garland; and Prince, P.E.I., Hamilton, Ont., and Restigouche, N.B., left vacant by the deaths of J. W. Richards, Hon. Sam Barker, and James Reid, of Restigouche.

## GERMANS FEAR ACTION BY ROUMANIA

**BUCHAREST, Nov. 18,** via Copenhagen and London, Nov. 20.—The newspaper Epoca asserts that Austrian and German troops have landed on the Roumanian island of Hurawal, in the Danube River, and that they are placing mines in the river and watching the movements of the Roumanian troops. The Epoca asks why the Roumanian government takes no action in this matter.

## HEAVY FIGHTING ON WESTERN FRONT

(Special to The Guardian)  
**PARIS, Nov. 21.**—The following official communication was issued by the War Office to-night:

Artillery actions have been spirited in Artois, around Loos and Hulluch as well as to the North of the Somme and North of Aisne in the region of Armentieres, Dancourt and Tillloy, and also near Soissons. The enemy works have been badly damaged by our fire. In Argonne, at Bolond, we exploded successfully two series of mines. Very violent cannonade has taken place in Vauquois, on the heights of the Meuse and in Bois des Chevaliers. The explosion of a German mine caused damage in our lines.

The Belgian official communication reads: Our advance posts and our positions in the neighborhood of Dixmude were bombarded and our artillery has counterbattered the German batteries and trenches and disposed of groups of military pioneers at divers points along the front in reply to the bombardment of Furness our aviators bombarded enemy concentrations at Nessen. In the East, quiet prevailed on the French front since the Bulgarian counter-attacks on our positions in the direction of Kovurlino. All attacks were repulsed with appreciable losses to the enemy. The landing of French and British troops at Salonika continues without incident.

## EARL KITCHENER HAS LEFT ATHENS

**LONDON, Nov. 21.**—An Athens despatch to Reuters says Earl Kitchener, British Secretary for War, after an audience with King Constantine lasting over an hour, had conferred with Premier Skouliadis and left Athens Saturday night.

### TOYS THAT HAVE AN EDUCATIONAL VALUE

The books of cut-out dolls and their furniture, animals and other toys are educational, says the Mother's Magazine, for they involve the co-ordination of cutting to line, folding and pasting to complete each object. The child welfare table and sandbox are important play devices from the point of view of construction. The table, if it will, a play table or a blackboard and contains materials for all kinds of work, including many of the educational occupations of the kindergarten. The sand-box, which contains sand and sand toys, is useful in outdoor plastic play.

There are sets of cut-out birds and animals which may be used as patterns from which innumerable other birds and beasts may be constructed. There is also a picture-book which consists of an equal number of pages of colored pictures and pages with merely the outline of the pictures upon them. The pictures are to be cut out, mounted neatly in their respective outlines, and the history of each written on the back of the page. When finished these can be bound together to make the child's own book.

The old-fashioned toy knitting spool is also valuable for the hand training. Then there is a toy village made of cardboard sections to be folded and fitted together according to an accompanying ground plan showing the 'old-out streets, flower beds, lakes and parks. There is also on one market a practical cart builder having wooden sections and small wheels by means of which a child can put together a wheelbarrow, coach, pig, machinery wagon, brick wagon, doll's go-cart and many other wheeled conveyances. There are twenty-five varieties of parts possible with this toy, all of which train the small builder's hands. A set of interlocking blocks allows of intricate constructions that cannot be attempted with ordinary blocks. The set includes over two hundred blocks of various shapes including curved pieces for arches, doorways and windows, which may be fastened together by means of interlocking strips that allow for great variety in intricate and all building.

There are also procurable educational outfits for head work simple baskets, stamp pictures, crepe paper masks, pictures, animals and birds, practical toy looms for weaving dolls' rugs and hammocks, and dyes for teaching children the beautiful art of block printing and stenciling on fabric.
