Comments On Dairy Production

The outstanding fact of this year's dairy production on the island has been the unusually fine pasturage which has been available throughout the season. 50 vinted Dairy Superintendent, Mr. H. J. MacDonald, Provincial Dairy Superintendent, stated in an interview with the Guardian yesterday afternoon.

The heaviest butter production for the summer occurred in the week ending July 10 when 13,770 lbs. were produced. Production figures for successive weeks since then are as follows: week ending July 17, 154,273 lbs.; July 24, 154,794 lbs.; August 7, 151,272 lbs.; August 14, 148,785 lbs.; August 21, 143,977 lbs.; August 28, 141,445 lbs.

Mr. MacDonald remarked that for five successive weeks previous to August 7th there was no appreciable change in butter production. The top volume for 1948 was a marked improvement over this previous figure.

ed a broken left shoulder, left leg and left wrist. There was also a slight cut over the left eye. The lungs showed evidence of pneumonia and in addition there was noticeable infection of the walls of the bladder. The three contributing factors to death would be the pneumonia, the bladder infection and toxic absorption from muscle damage in shoulder.

Constable J.W. Warbey of the Borden detachment of the R.C.M.P. told of going to the scene of the accident on Aug. 23rd and of finding a wagon load of hay overturned and a car owned by William Sharkey a little distance back. Dr. Boyer had been treating McKay on his arrival. Condition of the driver of the car was normal, witness stated. The car was a Quebec-licensed 1948 Chev. Sedan. A draft of the scene of the accident was then viewed by the jury.

Russell Ferguson, resident of Hampton told the jury when he had been coming along in the opposite direction to the hayload and car he had seen McKay make a turn to the right of the road and then turn to the left to go in his (McKay's) lane. Asked about the speed of the car at the time witness stated it was going at a moderate speed. He had also heard the horn blow.

Mrs. Mary Bruce Desable, sister of the victim told of hearing the crash as the car hit the rear of the load of hay and of her brother, McKay, being thrown to the road. She hadn't noticed any car passing the horse she was leading with a wagon behind the one driven by the deceased. On further questioning witness stated a wide turn was necessary in order to get in driveway.

Driver Gives Evidence William Sharkey, driver of the car and at present a resident of the victim told the jury of being on his way to Victoria in company with several other passengers. As he came over the crest of a slight hill in Desable he saw two loads of hay on the road going in his direction. Coming out of blowing his horn on coming up to the first load. As he was about to pass the second load the driver of the hay load pulled over to his left. He, the witness, attempted to swing his car to the right in order to avoid the collision but his car caught the rear end of the wagon, he said he was proceeding at about 40 miles when he first spotted the hayloads but had then slowed down.

At this point the jury examined the car of the victim but had no occasion to make an opinion. In answer to questions witness said he had noticed a man lying on the left hand side of the road after the crash. He talked to the man who told him he couldn't get up, that his hip was sore. He conducted his evidence by telling the jury of going into Crapaud in a passing car and notifying the driver of the accident while the driver who had taken him to Crapaud had called medical assistance.

James Kane, an occupant of the Sharkey car told of being headed for Victoria when the accident occurred. He corroborated the evidence of Sharkey about witnessing the hay loads, of the horn being blown and of Sharkey's attempt to avoid the crash.

Leonard Kane another occupant stated that Sharkey had driven carefully all the way from Moelle. He had not seen the first hay load as he had been looking towards the left hand side of the road. His was when he felt the car rolling and when he had looked up had seen driver Sharkey pulling to the right and then hitting the rear wheel of a hay cart.

Mrs. Alva Kane corroborated the previous witness' evidence. Adding to the evidence Mrs. Kane said she had asked Sharkey to drive carefully as she was nervous in a car. This, Sharkey had done, the witness stated.

Mr. Ralph Villab another passenger in the Sharkey car also corroborated the evidence given by the other passengers.

Final evidence was given by Dr. Boyer of Crapaud who in a statement read by the coroner told of giving the victim treatment at the scene of the accident. Treatment which included the bandaging of wounds and the injection of morphine to relieve suffering.

Dr. R.F. Seaman told of seeing George McKay in the Prince Edward Island Hospital on August 24th. His condition was not very good and he was suffering from

Bishop Boyle Indorses Acadian Fund Campaign

The following appeal in the form of a pastoral letter has been made by His Excellency Rt. Rev. James Boyle, Bishop of Charlottetown.

"At the annual meeting of the St. Thomas Aquinas Society held at Miscouche on August 8th, the Acadian people of Prince Edward Island through their representatives from every corner of the island, decided to launch a financial campaign in October next, with an objective of \$50,000, to provide an educational foundation for the benefit of Acadian youth. The appeal is to be made to the Acadian people alone, but there is no reason why the Catholic people generally should not assist their Acadian brothers to realize their praiseworthy objective as a means of equipping their sons and daughters for positions of influence in our economic, political, social and professional life commensurate with their numbers.

"From the annual earnings of the Connolly Estate and the St. Andrew's Society fairly large grants are paid each year to benefical students and as a consequence of these grants, our English speaking Catholic young men of limited means are enabled to receive a higher education. Some of these students are of high caliber and their courageous efforts to provide for their youth what is generally speaking people have already provided for their own."

"The splendid courage of the Acadian people in launching this drive is an evidence that they realize that without the benefits of a higher education their sons and daughters will be the hewers of wood and drawers of water for the rest of the population, whilst the higher functions of society, the professions of teaching, law, or medicine, the affairs of government, and leadership in general, will be in the hands of those who appreciate the value of education and who are willing to pay for it in dollars and cents.

Distinguished Service "For many years the St. Thomas Aquinas Society has rendered distinguished service to our Acadian youth of both sexes, and in fact to the whole population of the Island by helping to finance the education of priests, nurses, teachers, doctors, lawyers, farmers and others. The Society now, however, is unable to meet the many demands made upon its funds by Acadian boys and girls seeking high school and college education.

"The Acadian people constitute a considerable portion of our Catholic population in Prince Edward Island and if they are going to exercise their proportionate influence on the maintenance of our youth of both sexes, and if they must be encouraged and helped to enter the fields of education, nursing, government, journalism, business, radio, etc., for these are the great spheres of influence into which the energies of Christ have swarmed in every country they have set for run.
