**TUBERCULOSIS** death rates in Canada based on 1942 statistics range all the way from 231 per 100,000 in Saskatchewan to 80.3 in Quebec. The average rate in Canada for 1941 was 52.8 and by 1942 had dropped to 51.5.

Graded receipts delivered Charlottetown AL 48 1-2, AM 47 12, AP 40-5, B 40, C 38. Certified receipts delivered for cartoned eggs AL 52, AM 50, AP 47. Poultry receipts are coming in more plentifully. The price of brooding plants also heavy purchasers.

**Lady Astor Clashes With Laborites**  
LONDON, Dec. 8 (AP)—Lady Astor today had one of the roughest days for her long parliamentary career.  
Workers demonstrating in the lobby of the House of Commons this morning against the release from prison of Sir Oswald Mosley, leader of the British Unionist Movement, broke out in shouts when she said they were shirking the war effort.  
Later when she began a series of interruptions during debate, Labor member Emanuel Shinwell exclaimed:  
"Shout her out. Something ought to be done about her, you know."  
Several members protested against her repeated interruptions. Sir George Davies complained "we've had to put up with it for 20 years."  
Again, when Lady Astor applauded a point, saying "hear, hear," a labor member glared at her and cracked: "Some of us would like to try." The House cheered.  
The Viscountess got in the last word, however. A few minutes later when a hub-bub broke out on the labor benches, and members called "order, order," she rose and said tartly:  
"They are making much more noise than I am, but no one says anything to them."
