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NEW YORK Mt'l. Stock Exchange

(By Frederick Gardner, Associated Press Financial Writer) (A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Aug. 31.—The stock market flattened out into a lifeless drift today as pre-holiday stagnation settled over financial quarters.

With the Labor Day recess in the offing and a big textile strike looming, traders withdrew to the sidelines. One of the duller months in the memory of the present generation in Wall Street came to an end appropriately in an almost motionless stock market.

Renewed pressure on United States government bonds and a further decline in the pound sterling which fell below \$5 on a drop of more than two cents, diverted attention from stocks and commodities.

Fairly heavy selling of government securities was attributed in part to apprehensions that the present unsettledness in the foreign exchange market, resulting from the decline in sterling, might complicate the task the treasury is facing in its forthcoming \$1,700,000,000 financing.

There was not much liquidation in corporate bonds, however. Rallying power in stocks was feeble despite four sessions of slow advance in the open market price for American telegraph stock.

The Standard Statistics Co. average for 90 stocks dipped one-tenth of a point to 72.6. Volume shrank to 400,190 shares compared with 649,410 yesterday.

Metal shares picked up small gains as speculators watched the price in the open market price for London. The metal attained a record price of 140 shillings 11-12 pence an ounce.

Bulls on the metals saw a chance for renewal of inflationary agitation in the United States in the decline of sterling, which has fallen about 12 cents in the last week. U. S. Smelting rallied 1-2 points to 31. American Smelting, McIntyre, Dome and Alaska Juneau finished fractionally higher.

MONTREAL Exchange

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Aug. 31.—Apart from the rally of the two Canadian Industrial Alcohol issues late in the day which sent them both fractionally higher, there was little of interest in today's session of the Montreal Stock Exchange which saw but narrow changes in generally irregular course.

Only three stocks moved beyond the fractional range during the session, two of them bank issues. Bank of Montreal was one point higher at 195, and Royal Bank advanced two points at 156. Dominion Textile declined a full point at 84 1/2.

Canadian Industrial Alcohol "A" ended the day at 8 1/2, up 3/4 after a steady opening at 8 and with a 3 1/2 level holding most of the day. The "B" stock gained 1/2 in the day's trading, closing at 7 1/2 after touching the day's low of 7 early in the session. Activity in both the alcohol issues was confined almost entirely to the last half hour.

International Nickel was steady at the close, selling at 24 1/2. It opened at 24 1/2 and went to 24 3/4 during the day and this minor fractional range was characteristic of most active issues. Brazilian Traction lost 3/4 at 10 1/2. National Breweries was off 3/4 at 28 1/2, the reverse of its upward trend during the past few sessions.

Fractional gains were made by B. C. Power "A", Canadian Hydro Electric Preferred, and Shawinigan Power. Canadian Celanese, Canacum Pacific, Dominion Bridge, Gypsum Lime, McColl Frontenac, Canada Steamships preferred and Canada Cement were fractions lower.

Unchanged from their previous trading were Cokeshaw, P. W. C. Power "B", Dominion Steel and Coal "B", Montreal Power, National Steel and Car Power Corporation.

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CURRENCIES

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, Aug. 31.—Sterling today carried its decline in the last nine days to 49 1/2 cents. Closing at \$1.90 1/2 in the foreign exchange markets here today the pound showed a loss of 2 1/2 cents. An almost daily occurrence over the last week. Today, however, marked the first time the rate has fallen below \$3 since January. The low today was 4 3/8.

The Canadian dollar yielded the smallest fraction, closing at 2 1/4 percent premium against 1/4 yesterday. Heavy selling in all markets by Paris holders of sterling was reported, and furthermore it was said that the British government, being in accord with the idea of a cheaper pound, is not lending any official support to sterling against the franc in Paris.

MONTREAL, Aug. 31.—The pound was again weaker in Montreal, dollar exchanges today, the French franc and the United States dollar were unchanged. The franc was off 1 1/2 cents at \$4.80 1/2. The franc advanced 1/2 cent to 6.56 cents against the dollar, from 6.31 of one percent at 2 1/4 percent discount.
