### Getliffe Leads Former Maritime Players In Boosting Scoring Total

### CHATHAM TEAM ELIMINATES DAIRY KINGS

SUSSEX, N. B., March 2—By a bare margin of one goal for the two-game series Chatham Juniors became junior hockey champions of New Brunswick tonight, losing 3-2 to the Sussex Junior Dairy King in the last contest but winning the round 6-5 with the aid of a 4-2 victory in the first game.

Chatham will next cross sticks with Charlottetown Juniors at Chatham Wednesday and on the Island Friday for the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island championship.

Brilliant goal-tending by McIntyre, who handled 18 shots in the last period when the locals had five men up the ice, and overcame the Dairy Kings who missed three easy chances in the final five minutes, were largely responsible for the Sussex defeat. McIntyre made 32 stops in all, many of which seemed certain to score.

The lone first period tally came from the stick of Bolton, for Sussex, during a power play while two of the visitors were serving time. Both Rigled and McFarlane counted for Chatham in the middle session. A brace by Price and McAfee in the third period ended the scoring.

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### Island Rink Loses First Match 11-6

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, March 2—Western Canada rinks, every one of them curling like champions, won first round matches today as play started for the Canadian championship Macdonald Brier Trophy here. The Manitoba quartet from Winnipeg, skipped by J. K. Watson, led the western entries with a smashing 21-3 victory over Hector Cowan's Sarnia rink, representing Ontario.

A new Canadian champion will be crowned probably Thursday to succeed Gordon Campbell's Hamilton Thistles who won the trophy last winter. Campbell was eliminated in preliminary play to determine Ontario's representative this year.

One of the two new provinces to enter the sled this year, British Columbia, surprised veteran followers of "the roarin' game" by trouncing Prince Edward Island's rink 11-6. Prince Edward Island is the other province to enter the competition for the first time.

The British Columbia four was from Vancouver and was skipped by the veteran W. H. Whalem while P. E. I.'s entry was from Montague with J. A. McIntyre skipping.

Saskatchewan, represented by Les Youngson's Regina quartet, defeated Quebec City team 12-6. The Quebec entry was piloted by C. B. Bignell. Alberta was the fourth Western entry to win their first round match, beating Nova Scotia 15-5 while the fifth match resulted in a 13-8 win by New Brunswick's strong entry over the Northern Ontario rink.

Alberta, in winning from Nova Scotia, showed clever curling in piling up their impressive total. They built up perfect guards for their scores and were aided by failure of their opponents in properly judging the length of their shots.

The Alberta quartet from Edmonton was piloted by G. Wanless while a rink skipped by Professor Murray MacNeil from Halifax carried Nova Scotia's colors.

The Halifax rink, Northern Ontario champions and skipped by Emmett Smith, also started strongly and scored one on the first end against New Brunswick, represented by Campbellton and skipped by R. K. "Red" Shives. The veteran Campbellton four proved too much for the northerners, however, and plied 19 points with one and two-end margins.

Shives is one of the five "originals" at the "spiel" who took part in the Brier the first year it was put up for competition. Others were Murray MacNeil, who piloted Halifax and three members of the Northern Ontario rink, Mel Robb, Dan Miller and Skip Smith.

The 10th renewal of the major competition brought an entry from every province in Canada for the first time. In addition there was an entry from the Northern Ontario, strongly and afternoon matches will be run off tomorrow with the annual banquet scheduled at night.

The morning second round draw brings four unbeaten teams to tangle with New Brunswick and Manitoba with Saskatchewan and Ontario meaning matches Quebec and British Columbia try conclusions, Nova Scotia meets Northern Ontario and Prince Edward Island lines up against Ontario.

### New Champions Outplay Primroses In Second Game To Win Encounter 10-5

Climaxing a brilliant season, Borden Nationals last night added the Island Intermediate Hockey title to their McLean League crown when they defeated pentagon Primroses 10-5 in the second game of the two-game, total-goal series. Nationals took the round 16-10 having defeated the Montague team 6-5 in the opener. The game at Montague was finished under protest, Primroses claiming that one of the Borden counters had not crossed the line, but last night's clean cut victory by the Nationals dispelled all possibility of a dispute and the Borden team now meet the New Brunswick champions in the semi-finals.

Borden gave a convincing display last night and left little doubt as to their superiority. In the first two minutes of the game they slammed in two goals and before the session was over had added two more while holding the visitors to one tally. Their opening pentagon spurge gave them a four-goal lead on the round but still searching for goals, they scored four more times in the second period while again giving Primroses but one goal.

Although heavily outscored and with little hope left of lifting the title, Primroses gave the Nationals a hot battle of it in the final twenty minutes. They penned the Western team inside its own blue line and rained a barrage of rubber at the Borden cage; three times they drove the disc into the two goals to take but they were able to cut down the lead but little, Borden notching up two goals on breakaway plays from the visitors' gang attacks.

The game was clean and play was wide-open with the Nationals taking full advantage of playing on home ice to outguess and outskate their uncertain opponents. Clint Howatt was the game's leading scorer. The fleet wingman, spearhead of the homesters' continuous attack, counted four times. T. Paquet and E. Campbell scored two goals apiece, each had one goal to their credit.

McCarron, Fraser, Currie and Poole counted for the losers, Poole getting two.

### Amerk Players Leading Pointmakers In N.H.L.

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, March 2—New York Americans, driving confidently towards their first playoff berth in nine years, threaten to take all individual scoring honors of the National Hockey League season, the weekly statistics showed tonight.

Dave Schriner, Americans' left winger, continued to hold a wide margin in point leadership, while he has tied Cecil Dillon of New York Rangers for leadership in actual goals and Art Chapman, Schriner's centre mate, tops the whole league in assists.

Schriner has 18 goals, 23 assists, 41 points. Chapman also scored four points during the week all on assists, to take over second place in the Canadian section from Hooley Smith of Montreal Maroons. Chapman has 9-26-35 while Smith, with but one point in the week, held third by 17-16-33.

In the United States section the friendly rivalry of Chicago's ace front line continued with Paul Thompson, the left winger, replacing centre Doc Romnes at the top. Thompson scored a goal, aided in three others and reached 16-19-35.

Red Horner continued to pile up penalties and has served 143 minutes. Allan Shields of Maroons was next with 75. Alex Levinsky headed the United States section with 67.
