GOVERNMENT STATEMENT ON MONDAY

OTTAWA, Jan. 6.—(Canadian Press)—The government contemplates issuing a statement on reports of negotiations by private interests for bartering cattle for Soviet Russia's Oil. The likelihood now is that the statement will not be made before Monday. In the meantime, there is no comment on the attitude of headquarters of the United Farmers of Ontario to their organizations to support a barter.
