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PLAN TO USE PROVINCIAL ARTIFICIAL KIDNEY QUOTA FOR NEXT HOUSE

Germans to Apply Invention of Hopkins Medical Man

(British United Press) BALTIMORE, July 13.—German scientists are planning to use an artificial kidney invented by Dr. John Abel of Hopkins medical school, to save life in cases of corrosive sublimate poisoning and other maladies where death is a consequence of over working of the kidneys it was learned at the Hopkins School today.

Efforts to use the artificial kidney in Baltimore but failed because Dr. Abel's work on it was interrupted by the war and he did not have the parts of the kidney and could not make it available for use here.

Physicians believe that through it many lives which otherwise would be sacrificed will be saved in future, especially the lives of those who attempt suicide by taking bichloride of mercury or corrosive sublimate. The number so poisoned have been very large. The false kidney is a tube of glass and other matter which can be attached to the arm or some other part of the body. This is connected with an artery on one side and a vein on the other, so that the blood flows through it. Impurities are filtered by means of an artificial kidney through the waters of the body and are drawn from the false kidney on which the real kidney rests.

TRIUMPH FOR OF DIPLOMACY OF BRITAIN

Americans and British Now Control Situation

(British United Press) LONDON, July 13.—Premier Herriot's victory in the French Senate is understood to be the greatest triumph for English diplomacy since the present government accepted power.

Poincare, lacking an international idealism was really an enemy of the League of Nations and ever endeavoring to make France the dominating European power failed in his great attack. The Dawes plan is now safe and England controls the situation with American co-operation.

The positions taken up by the dominions are important as Europeans are realizing that they reflect the attitude of those who suffered in the war yet are detached from its immediate problems. While full credit is given to France for its patriotic stand, claim is made by some that Premier MacDonald betrayed France through endeavoring to substitute the Dawes report for certain financial articles of the Versailles treaty.

Special Squadron Leaves Frisco

(Canadian Press) SAN FRANCISCO, July 13.—The British special service squadron headed by H. M. S. Hood, the world's greatest battleship, steamers and San Francisco harbor today after a four day's stay, marked by a round of entertainment.

The big British fighter started out for the Panama Canal where the squadron will divide, the Hood the battle cruiser Repulse and the Australian cruiser Adelaide, continuing through the canal to Jamaica, and the four light cruisers, Dragon, Dauntless, Danse, and Delhi, setting out for a trip around the Horn.

Pastor is Fined For Cruelty

ORANGE NATAL DAY CELEBRATION AT BORDEN

A Grand Success Socially and Financially—Borden a Ideal Spot—About Three Thousand Persons Present

At 9 o'clock Saturday morning a special train consisting of 8 standard coaches drawn by two engines pulled out of Charlottetown depot with a goodly number of passengers and the Pipe's band bound for Borden. At every station a large number of people were found waiting and by the time the train reached Borden it was completely packed.

The trains from the west also brought in large crowds of people and hundreds of automobiles were in evidence.

Arriving at Borden the Brotherhood formed in procession at the station and marched to the picnic grounds where a large number of tea tables were very conveniently and comfortably arranged under a covering of birch foliage.

Refreshment booths were in evidence everywhere and in the centre of the field was a platform erected, where the speakers addressed the vast audience.

The day was spent in every respect for an outing and although very sultry, the refreshing breeze from the nearby Straits of Northumberland made it delightful.

Arriving at the ground the Rev. Mr. McPherson in the absence of the Mayor, his courtesy was authorized to extend a most cordial welcome to the brotherhood and guests in general. This was done in his most pleasing manner and replied to by the Rt. Worshipful Grand Master Bro. J. Y. Phillips.

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SPARKS' CIRCUS GRAND PARADE ARRIVED HERE YESTERDAY

Took Four Trips of Car Ferry to Transport Big Show—Today's Program

The arrival yesterday afternoon of Sparks' Circus, the 20th Century Wonder Show, the first section of which arrived at the station at 2 p. m. caused considerable excitement. Transportation of the entire show, involving four round trips by the Car ferry, was completed at six o'clock and the work of putting up the big tops immediately began.

The modern travelling equipment used by the organization consists of twenty all-steel cars from seventy to seventy-six feet in length, being the largest and most in the world.

The personnel of Sparks' is on a par with its transportation unit in size, there being four hundred people in its employ. Two hundred horses, six elephants, and camels and zebras are included in its menagerie.

The various animal cages and drays, hauled by elephants, horses and ponies attracted large crowds to the curbs of the streets through which they lumbered and great numbers flocked to the grounds to watch the operations of erection and to view such of the animals as could be seen.

The circus has a continental reputation, so wide that the character of a book recently published by E. Appleton & Co., and written by Ed. Shapiro were drawn from its personnel.

Some of the menagerie beasts are of unusual interest, five of the lions having been used in the photo-play "Tarzan of the Apes". The black leopard is one of the only five on exhibition in America.

Altogether the visit of such a large and costly organization says much for Charlottetown reputation as a "live centre."

BULGARS RISE, OFFICIALS ARE KILLED

Many Shot Down by Gov't Troops—700 Arrested

(Canadian Press) ATHENS, July 13.—Martial law has been declared throughout the Bulgaria district of Bulgaria following a revolutionary uprising in which the rebels killed the prefect and other officials and many of their number were shot down in clashes with Government troops.

Sofia dispatches state that sporadic uprisings on the part of Agrarians started last week and gradually took the form of a revolution throughout the district along the Black Sea.

Troops loyal to the present regime made more than 700 arrests at Varna and elsewhere.

Much of the fighting among the Agrarians, Communists, Republicans and Government forces appears to have been of a rough and tumble character, but reports of numerous casualties indicated the troops were forced to use their arms.

Pirates Killed Captain, Threw Body Overboard

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, July 13.—Following the report from Halifax that the French steamship Mulhouse was boarded off the New Jersey Coast two weeks ago by rum pirates who took a cargo of liquor valued at five million dollars, prohibition officials here today received word that a second ship was also boarded by pirates, who killed the Captain and threw his body overboard.

The identity of the steamship was not revealed but it was said to be also of foreign registry.

The raids were directed by one of the biggest bootleggers in this country, according to the report, in retaliation for cutting of rum prices by the foreign ship.

Last Minute News Flashed in Over the Wires

(Canadian Press) CONSTANTINOPLE, July 13.—United States army fliers left Constantinople at 6.10 this morning Greenwich time for Bucharest, Rumania.

(Canadian Press) QUEBEC, July 13.—Five houses were completely destroyed by fire yesterday afternoon in less than two hours in St. Come, Beuce County, and two others were greatly damaged the losses being estimated at about \$35,000.
