Nazis New "Poland" Is Predicted

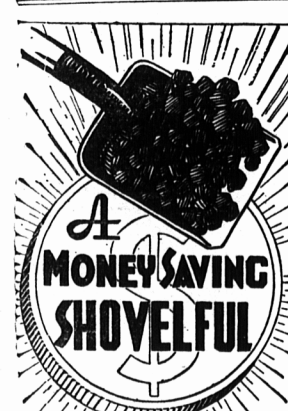

BERLIN, Oct. 25.—The Poland which Germany intends to rear on the wreckage of the conquered Polish Republic was said in informed Nazi circles today as likely to be characterized by these five features:

It will be made up of Poles only; it will be smaller than the Russian Poland of pre-1914 days; it will, however, retain Poland's religious centre, Czestochowa, and patriotic centre, Krakow; it will also likely contain a Jewish state within a state embracing Lublin between the Vistula and San Rivers; it will be saddled from the beginning of its existence with a tremendous financial burden arising from the necessity of reimbursing all Poles crowded out of their former habitats in the parts annexed by Germany.

Officials declare everything relating to Poland is still in a state of flux, yet Adolf Hitler's decree published on Oct. 19, confirming annexation of parts of Poland, as well as private talks with men definitely in the know, reveal the picture as given above. Hitler's decree annexed Pomorze, Posen and Polish Upper Silesia, which were German territory before the Versailles settlement.

Poles will be ejected from all sections annexed by the Reich. Albert Forster, Nazi chief in Danzig, is the authority for the statement that this will be done ruthlessly. In their places will settle Germans coming "home into Reich" from Baltic States under Hitler's migration plan.

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Canadian Navy Hungry For Bit Of Action

AT 5 A STRIKE THE CONVOY'S NAVAL ESCORT, Oct. 25.—(CP)—The men who are waging the war at sea for Canada have only one grouse. There isn't enough action to suit these eager sailors of the Royal Canadian Navy.

"When are we going to get in some fighting?" That's the standard question among the seamen as they go about their workaday duties patrolling Canada's eastern coast or conveying the freighters out to sea.

So far in this war, there's been little in the way of actual combat. The suspected presence of a U-boat off Halifax brought on one flurry of action; that's the only one the navy has disclosed.

A Landlubber's View

But as a landlubber completing a trip on a C-nvoying destroyer, this reporter found enough in shipboard life to give him a new appreciation of a war on the sea.

The fact that "rain through the far end of a tropical tricorn didn't make things any duller, either."

While the d-destroyer was with the convey, guarding the eastbound freighters against enemy attack, the ship's officers and men worked at deck stations. Ammunition was manned always, with the crew on "four hours on and four hours off" basis.

Tumbling into bunks and hammocks after a long stretch in the biting weather, their sleep had barely begun before they were woken up again.

The captain, almost ceaselessly on the rocking bridge, was busy, snatched cat-naps in a tiny cabin about the bridge. Officers would drop wearily into the wardroom to doze, fully clothed, in chairs while they waited their next watch.

Down in the wardroom, where we ate, dishes and table still wouldn't get together for more than a couple of lurches at a time. Until he mastered the knack of holding down dishes with one hand and eating with the other, this reporter ate under handicaps. At that, it was only when they served sautéed potatoes for dinner one night, non-sailable food being de rigueur at that articular moment in the weather—that we could handle it like a destroyer man.

Cooks Have Troubles

But we thought the cooks got the worst of it. As the ship hit the lumpy spots, pots and pans had an uneven, jerky motion.

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Says Athenia Passenger Was Pro-Nazi

"The Londoner's Diary" in the Evening Standard said today that Daniel Anderson, whose affidavit concerning the liner Athenia is being exploited by Joseph Goebbels for anti-Churchill propaganda, "strongly pro-Nazi and makes no secret of his admiration for Adolf Hitler."

The Diary identified Anderson as a former lawyer from Chicago who visits England every year. It was said he has been conducting parties of American college girls around Europe and particularly Germany, at £150 each.

"He was to have visited this year's Nuremberg (Nazi party) congress but when it was cancelled he took his party back to America in the Athenia."

(Anderson asserted that the Athenia, torpedoed Sept. 3 with the loss of 100 lives, carried guns for coastal defence in Canada. Anderson also claimed that the ship "did not sink immediately" and that he learned later that it was sunk by British destroyers as it was a floating derelict. Anderson's allegation about guns was termed "tommyrot" by the Athenia's operators who pointed out that she sailed before war was declared. Last night the Canadian external affairs department said "it has now been proven conclusively that the Athenia carried no guns, ammunition or munitions of war. The British admiralty remarking that testimony and accounts of the incident speak for themselves, retorted that "the Athenia was sunk by a German submarine."

Goebbels, German propaganda minister, in a broadcast Sunday repeated the old German claim that the Athenia had been sunk by Great Britain in an effort to enlist the aid of that she sailed before war was declared.

(The London Daily Express said today that while London had been inclined at first to ignore Goebbels, the government now is making an overwhelming collection of evidence to refute his accusations. The Express said that available proof that the ship was destroyed by a Ger-

man U-boat is so complete that it has been decided to unmask the Nazi allegations once and for all.)

NEED CHAIR ASSISTANTS

OTTAWA, Oct. 23.—(CP)—The National Defence Department announces that the Canadian Dental Corps has a need for a limited number of well-trained young men to act as chair assistants.

These men must be able to pass a grade "A" medical examination. They also will have to take considerable elementary training in operative dentistry.

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Pound And Dollar In Slight Gains

NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—The local "free" market price for the pound overlapped the official range established by the Bank of England when the currency rose 7-8 of a cent today to \$4.02 1/8.

(The Bank of England has offered to buy sterling at \$4.02 and sell at \$4.06).

The French franc also improved and the gulder was marked up a notch in relation to the dollar. The Swiss franc remained unchanged.

The belga cracked up a bit further with a loss of .03 of a cent after several attempts at rallying with a price close to the year's low in recent foreign exchange dealing. The Canadian dollar gained 1-16 cent to 10 7/16 discont. against United States funds.

FRESHMAN'S MONEY HAD EYES POPPING

EDMONTON, Oct. 25.—(CP)—Reversing the traditional standing a freshman at the University of Alberta had his senior classmen gasping. He preferred a \$50 bill when asked to pay a 50-cent class fee.

"Is that all you've got," one of the seniors queried. Promptly the freshman replaced it with a \$100 bill.

The officials said it was the largest display of "holding" money they had ever seen. "And we had no dice," one of them moaned.

DRISDENT, Ont. Oct. 23.—(CP)—Daniel Woodrow, 75, and his bride of a week, the former Mrs. Mary Meadows, 80, have settled down to the quiet routine of married life. Woodrow explains their marriage was not love at first sight but the result of three years courtship.

Mrs. Woodrow was born near Kingston and her second husband died 11 years ago. She met Woodrow, born near Woodstock three years ago.

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R. A. F. Field In France Is Described

WITH THE ROYAL AIR FORCE SOMEWHERE IN FRANCE (Passed by R.A.F. Censor) Oct. 25.—In the misty plains behind the Maginot Line where the rain has poured down for nearly a week, I inspected today one of the advanced posts of the Royal Air Force.

Concealed among the foliage of a belt of trees, the post was hard to spot from the main road and probably could not have been discerned from above.

Outside the commander's hut the camouflaged planes stood ranged over the muddy surfaces of the flying field, spaced well apart so that in event of an attack no more than one machine could be disabled by a single bomb.

The commander, a native of Tasmania, was leaning over a desk made of packing cases writing a letter home.

Inviting me to sit down on a biscuit tin he told me "there's little to do but wait. I am trying to teach the men Australian rules of football on the muddy aerodrome but they can't play football all day."

VICKS VA-TRO-NOL

Herridge To Contest Seat For New Democracy

OTTAWA, Oct. 25.—Hon. W. D. Herridge, leader of the New Democracy Movement, is in a strategic position to become leader of the third largest group in the House of Commons by the time Parliament meets next January, it was indicated on parliament hill tonight by political observers.

The Ottawa lawyer has accepted an invitation to be the New Democracy candidate in Kindersley, Sask., constituency. It was announced from his office here Saturday. The decision was made after O. B. Elliott (SC-Kindersley) resigned his Commons' seat providing the vacancy thus necessitating a by-election.

With close affiliation now existing between the Social Credit Party and New Democracy and with Social Credit M. P.'s designated as New Democracy's official representatives, there would be no change in the riding's party representation in parliament if Mr. Herridge was elected.

Since the war started and the general election has been deferred, it has been a general understanding here that in case of by-elections the candidate nominated by the party holding the riding would not be opposed. This policy has been advanced to prevent undue political campaigning.

Mr. Herridge originally planned to contest the Prince Albert, Sask., constituency against Prime Minister Mackenzie King but the New Democracy group in that riding released its leader to enable him to accept the Kindersley nomination.

Should the decision for such action come in midwinter, bad weather conditions would hardly be likely to prevent it being carried to a successful conclusion.
