Contract Bridge

A BRILLIANT PLAY

It is not often that one sees as fine a defensive play as West made in the following deal!

South dealer.
Both sides vulnerable.

♠ K Q 10 8 2
♥ Q J 5
♦ 8 6
♣ A 6

♠ A 10
♥ 5 2
♦ J 7 4 3 2
♣ 8 5 4

♠ 8 5 4
♥ 9
♦ A K 10 6
♣ A 10 5

The bidding:
South West North East
1NT 2♠ 2♠ Pass
2♥ Pass 3NT Pass

West gave considerable thought to opening a club, but he decided that his heart suit offered the most hope. When South won the first trick with the heart nine, West knew, of course, where the king and jack were. He was sure that South led a low spade, and West properly ducked. The queen won and declarer now led the diamond five to his own ace. It was here that West grooved himself. If he had discarded "normally" on this trick, declarer would have had easy sailing — he simply would have led another spade toward dummy, forcing out the ace, and then would be in a position to claim ten tricks.

West, however, had been doing some thinking. It was obvious that declarer lacked the spade jack, because, holding that card, he would not have troubled to lead a diamond to his own hand for a spade lead toward dummy. So, after some rapid figuring, West discarded the spade ace on South's diamond trick!

The effect of this brilliant play is apparent. Now declarer could win only one more spade trick without giving East the lead, and to do that would incur a heart return through the King-Jack to West's long suit. After West's imaginative play, declarer could not win more than two spades, one heart, four diamonds and one club, and thus was defeated in a contract that appeared to be iron-clad.
