Speaking of the palpable drawbacks of the American system The Herald proceeds to say: "Whatever this form of government may be termed, it cannot be called democratic; that is, the influence of a popular election under such circumstances is now, where near as immediate and direct as it is in either England or France. No doubt the constitution of the United States was considered a liberal scheme of national control at the time it was drafted, but it has to be remembered that was some century and a quarter ago, when the divine right of rulers was everywhere receiving popular recognition. In the interval of time that has since elapsed public opinion concerning forms of government has undergone a great change.

"It has been impossible in this country, in consequence of constitutional limitations, for us to materially alter the scheme of government we received from the hands of our conservative fore-fathers, but the English, having no written constitutional limitations placed upon their action, have moved ahead while we have stood still; and politically free communities all over the world instead of copying the form of the American constitution as was their custom to, fifty to 100 years ago, now copy, if they wish a free government, the democratic parliamentary institutions of Great Britain as being much more in keeping with advanced political ideas.

Moreover The Herald sees, what has been for a good while apparent to statesmen of other countries that the drift of the national government in the United States is toward the formation of an oligarchy. The political control of the great States has already passed into the hands of senatorial bosses. As in ancient Rome the fiction of a republic was maintained for generations after the government had become autocratic, so, says The Herald, "we may continue to have the fiction of free political institutions, when in reality we are governed by those who form what may be described as an irresponsible oligarchy."

CRUELTY TO ANIMALS THE ROADWAY ETC.

Sir—Has Charlottetown a Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals? Several cases of cruelty during the past week, have taken place in the city and not a week goes by but one sees poor dumb beasts, being driven along with sticks and stones; only a few days ago we noticed an ox being dragged along by the horns tied with a rope to a wagon or sledge, and when the poor beast lay down it was beaten and kicked. The sight caused the blush of shame to mount to the face of more than one onlooker, but nothing was done to rectify the matter.

Farmers and others having animals to move any distance should provide proper conveyances and thus would the matter of undue cruelty be helped to a great degree. In other cities such a thing as dragging beasts along by the horns, beating, over-loading and other-wise ill-treating dumb brutes would not be tolerated, and I think an example should be made or a heavy fine imposed on any person or persons in the future who so far forget themselves as to ill-use a dumb beast.

Now just a word in regard to the Gentlemen's Driving Club. I believe it is a good thing, and something we should have had years ago, but I must say I cannot do otherwise than object to the using of the Park Roadway as a speedway, and I am sure I voice the sentiments of nine tenths of the people of Ch. Town in this matter. Our city fathers or any other city officials cannot devote its use to any one body of people, except the public who are the owners, and I am surprised at some of the agitators. No sir the Park Roadway should not be used one hour of the day or even once a month as a speedway.

If the Club want a place to speed their horses let them go to the Driving Park or get a course of their own where they can go and trot to their hearts content any hour of the day and the public will not be endangered. They now are by some people who use the Roadway as a race-course even to fast trotting. What would be the result? The Club got what they are asking for. No we don't want any race course hunted over to a few gentlemen who have nice looking horses, thereby robbing the masses of the best part of our Park Roadway.
