**Toronto Police Case Reviewed**

TORONTO, May 4 (CP)—Toronto Police Commission today reinstated a suspended police inspector, suspended the pay of a detective-sergeant and reprimanded a sergeant for neglect of duty.

The Commission was both reviewing earlier decisions and examining a new charge of police brutality against a prisoner.

Today's rulings were:

Inspector George Crawford, previously suspended indefinitely, now found negligent in not reporting acts of subordinates and reprimanded.

Detective-Sergeant Frank Craddock, formerly dismissed, now suspended to Oct. 1, when on completion of 25 years' service, he will be eligible for a \$1,000 annual pension.

(Both charges arose from the beating of John Wilkins Dec. 29 following his arrest on an armed robbery charge.)

Sergeant Herbert Rehill was found guilty of neglect of duty.
