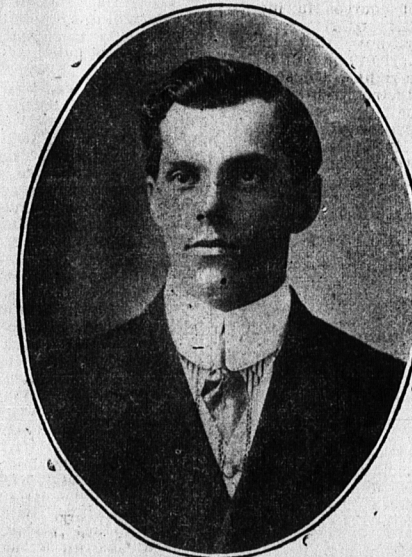

### NORTHCLIFFE'S CRIME.

LONDON, Wednesday, June 16.—Bernard Shaw has written to the wife of Sheehy Skeffington, who last week was sentenced in Dublin to six months at hard labor, for making an anti-recruiting speech and released army from a hunger strike. Mr. Shaw conveys the treatment of Skeffington with Lord Northcliffe. "The latter," says Shaw, "not only

endeavored to stop voluntary recruiting by refusing to insert War Office appeals, but actually, with the same object—that of bringing about conscription—publishes a letter from the Bishop of Pretoria, conveying the impression not only to the English but to the German public that the British army in Flanders was outnumbered and must presently fall a prey to its enemies unless conscription was at once resorted to.
