A SINISTER SILENCE IN THE UPPER PROVINCE PRESS.

There are some things that the thirty millions, or to vociferate that Ontario and Quebec newspapers are very shy of discussing. Among the number are the foremost journals of Canada, representing both the great political parties, and various shades of independent opinion in this great country. They print the news, and give their judgment from day to day upon a great variety of subjects, domestic and foreign, political, scientific, social, moral and religious. But they are dumb as oysters upon some questions which are from year to year occupying an increasing share of attention in Eastern Canada. It is not that the matters to which we are about to refer are unimportant or trivial. They are in the opinion of many people in Eastern Canada of prime importance.

One of these questions is the relative cost on capital account and for maintenance and operation of the Government Canals and the Government Railways. Another is the question of the proposed big land grab of Quebec, Ontario and Manitoba. There is a well-defined opinion in Eastern Canada that on these questions, as on the provincial subsidy question, the big central Provinces are, to put it somewhat coarsely "playing the hog." The canals cost some ten millions more than the intercolonial, and sink a million a year but are maintained free of tolls in the interest of Quebec, Ontario, and the west exclusively. All traffic on the intercolonial railway is made to pay for carriage, but because the intercolonial does not always make both ends meet the Ontario and Quebec newspapers have periodical his and brainstorms. But when asked why the canals should not also be made to pay, they are as dumb as oysters. As to the proposed land-grab, a contemplated act of plunder and spoliation unequalled since the division of Poland, the press of the three Provinces which are to gobble up three quarters of a million square miles, treat the question as one belonging exclusively to themselves, a mere domestic concern of their own in which the Maritime Provinces have no concern whatever. It was the same with the Provincial subsidies question. Ontario and Quebec were by the constitution, limited in the matter of per capita subsidy from the Dominion, to eighty cents per head on their population as it was in 1861. By the right of the strong, and the greedy, by sheer voting power, they have made this subsidy payable upon the increased population since gained, and to be gained hereafter—a matter of over a million dollars a year now to the big Provinces and to be much more hereafter—and this without any compensation worthy of the name to the eastern partners in the Dominion concern.

These transactions, to cite no further instances—all bear the earmarks of greed and graft, none the less despicable because it is Provinces instead of individuals that are dividing the spoil. But the newspapers of Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto or Winnipeg will not discuss the interpretive aspect of these matters or treat them in the light of fair play and justice between East and West. They would find it extremely inconvenient and troublesome to do so before any honorable enlightened court of honor or of decent public opinion. To attempt discussion would be to court defeat. They dare not discuss the railway and the canal questions together. It is easier to shout for a new Georgian Bay Canal to cost a hundred millions, a new Welland Canal to cost

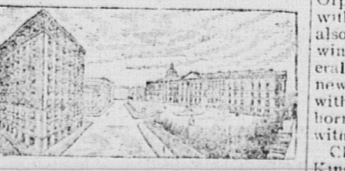
